BOER STAMP BOOM.

Great Demand for "V.R.I." Free State Stamps in London.

London Daily Mail: There is a big boom in South African stamps. The war has enhanced their value and has enormously increased the demand for them.

Several dealers whom a Daily Mail representative consulted yesterday agreed that there has never been such a rush on South African issues.

Mr. F. R. Ginn of the Strand, London, who is the sole agent for the Free State stamps, commented on the fact that the demand for the Orange Free State stamps is so great that they are being sold at a premium.

Some of the old Transvaal stamps, of the British regime, are being sold at a premium of 20 to 50 per cent.

McGAHAN, THE DARING RIDER.

Mr. Stoyan Vatralsky Asked President McKinley's Co-operation to Secure a Memorial.

Washington, June 5.—Mr. Stoyan Vatralsky, who came to Washington to interest President McKinley in the project of erecting a suitable monument over the remains of War Correspondent McGahan at New Orleans, had an interview with the President this afternoon.

Mr. Vatralsky found the President already an admirer of McGahan's character and his achievement. The President promised Mr. Vatralsky his endorsement and co-operation in his movement to erect a monument to Mr. McGahan.

THE AURORA BANK ROBBERY.

Detective Cuddy Returns From Chicago to Prepare a Case for Extradition of Rutledge.

Detective Cuddy, who went to Chicago last week for the three alleged Aurora bank burglars, returned to the city last night and will spend the next several days gathering evidence to back up his application for their extradition, when the case comes up again in Chicago on the 14th.

HAVANA POSTOFFICE BROOKEDNESS.

Charles F. W. Neely, Alleged Ambassador, to Be Transferred to the Cuban Capital.

New York, June 5.—Request papers having been signed by Governor Roosevelt in the case of Charles F. W. Neely, charged with having embezzled postal funds of the United States in Cuba, preparations are being made by the Federal authorities for the transfer of the prisoner to Havana.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

General Greely Has Ordered the Adoption of the Marconi System at San Francisco.

New York, June 5.—Brigadier-General Greely, chief signal officer, said last night that he had directed the establishment of wireless telegraphic stations in the harbor of San Francisco and in Puerto Rico and the Philippines, says a Washington despatch to the Herald.

People Came Down Town Last Night to See the Celebration, But the Story Had Been Told.

EVERYBODY SEEMED SATISFIED

That the Official Bulletin Backed Up the Celebration of Last Week.

Many citizens came down town last night, expecting that there would be some big doings to celebrate the real occupation of Pretoria by Gen. Roberts; but their expectations were not realized beyond the fact that everyone seemed quietly satisfied with the knowledge that the event had been warmly celebrated in anticipation last week.

A score of newboys carried a Kruger dummy, on an improvised stretcher, and made an unearthly din from a collection of sticks and tin cans. Other youthful enthusiasts dangled lengths of stovepipe and the like, from the rear of their bicycles, but the little German band at present sojourning in the city provided nearly all the music.

The city was profusely decorated with flags and bunting, much of which has been hanging continuously since the relief of Mafeking. The citizens were flags on their apparel, and were generally jubilant, but did not hold over.

The news that Pretoria was the present postoffice address of Gen. Roberts spread through the city early in the day. Fire bells, whistles and other instruments of noise told the story, and no one doubted what it was.

There was a constant stream of people at the newspaper offices for further particulars, and any news that was forthcoming was greedily received, but the spent itself on the celebration last Wednesday night and Thursday.

FORTY FAMILIES HOMELESS.

Big Mill of Price Bros. & Co., at St. Etienne, on the Saguenay, Destroyed by Fire.

Quebec, June 5.—A despatch from Tadoussac says that the large lumber establishment at St. Etienne du Saguenay, near that place, belonging to Price Bros. & Co., of Quebec, was totally destroyed by fire this afternoon.

By what can be learned this evening, the loss is very great, and includes 300,000 feet of lumber, stores, all the wharves, one schooner and two lathouses that were moored at the wharf.

Forty families are rendered homeless by the conflagration, and are in destitute condition, without food and scarcely any clothing. Most of the people worked in the mill and lumber and are badly off.

The captain of the steamer Saguenay has been wired to stop at St. Etienne and take the unfortunate buildings that were swept away. The fire is supposed to have been started by the colonel's cook, and is estimated to be between \$350,000 and \$400,000.

INDIA FAMINE HORRORS.

P. & O. Steamship Company Gives \$5000—Cholera Ravages Province in Bombay.

London, June 5.—The Peninsular and Oriental Steamship Company has donated £5000 to the Indian Famine Fund.

The viceroys, Lord Curzon and Kitchener, telegraphs that cholera continues in many of the Bombay districts. The condition of the people there is deplorable, as a number of the large works are deserted.

The Bombay Government has authorized the opening of scattered village works, and it is reported that the situation is very difficult to deal with. Elsewhere, the relief measures are efficient, generally in British India, and are improving in the native states.

THE MEETING WAS PACKED.

Reid Employes in Newfoundland Gathered to Protest, But They Were Outnumbered.

St. John's, Nfld., June 5.—A public meeting of the employes of the Reid Works, who were discharged as the result of the Government's decision to permit the formation of a liability company by Mr. Reid, was held in this city this evening to protest against the Government's action. It was, however, captured by the supporters of the Government.

Drowned After His Baptism.

Memphis, Tenn., June 5.—Less than three minutes after receiving the sacrament of his pastor, James Phillips was today drowned in the waters in which he had been baptized in the presence of his wife and horrified brethren of his congregation and other spectators.

After the final benediction Phillips had gone aboard the steamer Wichita to put on dry clothing. He had scarcely stepped aboard the steamer when he fell backward over the side of the boat and was swept down by the rapid current.

The New Forts at Metz.

Berlin, June 5.—The Emperor has decreed that the three new forts near Metz, shall bear the names of the three Princes, Prince of Prussia, Prince of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, and Prince of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, respectively, in order to show "I and my house are related to the Reichland."

Miss Mary Kingsley Dead.

Cape Town, June 5.—Miss Mary H. Kingsley, traveler, and niece of Canon Kingsley, is dead. She expired at Simons town, where she had been superintending the nursing arrangements of the military hospital.

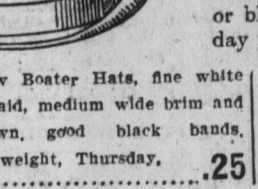

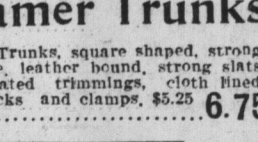
