



### YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS J. WALDRON DIES SUDDENLY

Town Assessor for Newmarket Passes  
Away While on a Visit to His  
Brother-in-Law.

Newmarket, June 4.—(Special).—John Waldron, town assessor of Newmarket, died suddenly early this morning. Last evening he visited the home of his brother-in-law, Albert Marles, on the second concession of East Gwillimbury. He appeared to be in the best of health and enjoyed a hearty supper at 10 o'clock. About half past two this morning he was awakened by a noise. He was awakened by hearing Mr. Marles making a peculiar gasping noise. On investigating it was found that he had just passed away. Mr. Waldron was 52 years of age and was a native of the neighborhood from England half a century ago. He was at one time a county constable and was highly respected. He leaves a grown up family of four sons, all in the Toronto Railway, and two daughters, one in Hull, Que., and the other in North Toronto. He was a member of Kingsville Lodge, A.O.U.W.

### FIREMAN'S CLOSE CALL.

Driver of Aerial Truck Almost  
Victim of Bad Roads.

That little angel who sits up aloft to take care of the life of the engine, also keeps an eye on the fireman. Otherwise James Leslie, driver of the aerial truck at Lombard-street, might have been the victim of a fatal accident while turning out on an alarm early Sunday morning.

At 1:14 a.m. the Lombard-street companies were called to Box 28 and had to make use of Jarvis-street to reach King. Jarvis-street is in very bad shape, the holes are numerous and extensive and it is impossible for the firemen to make time in the dark.

Leslie was busy handling his heavy team when the front wheel of the apparatus plunged into a crevasse and the driver was thrown—he himself is thoroughly convinced—a good two feet in the air. It was only by the merest chance, that he alighted on the small curb, but he fell on his head and was seriously injured. He was taken to the hospital and is now lying in a critical condition.

The fire itself was in a frame shed in rear of 222 East King-street. The damage was \$75.
