TO CARRY FREIGHT ON STREET CARS

Montreal Will Have It Taken Through Streets Day and Night.

COMMERCIAL BODIES WANT IT

Railway Pretends Not to be Anxious for It—City to Get a Revenue From It.

Montreal, Aug. 15.—There is every indication that the City of Montreal will grant the Montreal Street Railway a franchise to handle a freight service on its lines. The city has drafted a bylaw under which it will be willing to give the company such a franchise, and it is expected that after certain modifications they will be agreed to by the street railway company.

The proposal that the street railway company should handle freight, strange to say, did not come from the company itself, but from the leading local commercial bodies like the Board of Trade, the Manufacturers' Association, and the Chamber of Commerce, who petitioned the city council that such a franchise should be given the street railway, with a view of relieving the freight congestion that is so acute in the entire business section of the city throughout the shipping season.

Room for It

The main cause of this congestion is that the industrial development of Montreal has occurred mainly in the extreme west end and extreme east end of the city, meaning, as a rule, particularly long hauls for all kinds of cartage business. It is believed that by having this class of business handed over to the electrical lines a good deal of the congestion and delay would be relieved.

In the negotiations the street railway has not appeared over-anxious to establish a freight department, mainly because it was trying to get the franchise without paying much for it. They claim that for a long time it will be largely experimental, and maintain that a freight department has not paid in any of the American cities.

It is intended that the hours for hauling freight should be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. So far all large commercial bodies have been in favor of such a franchise being given the company, and the only opposition is from some of the unions, who are apprehensive that it will mean less work for regular carters. It is claimed that the city, with its steep hills and long hauls, would be particularly adapted for a good freight service. According to the bylaw prepared, it is intended that the company should pay the city 50 cents for every car handled and the charge for the hauling not to exceed 35 cents a ton.

ROCKEFELLER SEES FINANCIAL CHAOS

Cleveland, Aug. 15.—John D. Rockefeller's answer to President Roosevelt's anti-trust litigation campaign is a prophecy of financial disaster that will sweep the country from end to end.

"What, in your opinion, will be the effect on the country of the present policy of the President toward great business combinations?" Mr. Rockefeller was asked.

"The policy of the present administration," Mr. Rockefeller said earnestly and deliberately, "toward great business combinations of all kinds have only one result. It means disaster to the country, financial depression and financial chaos."

"I will go further and say today, that because of the administration with its reports every five minutes of new actions and of heavy fines, the country is already beginning to drift toward the rocks of financial depression."

"Confidence is gone, and confidence is the basis of all prosperity. With confidence established there can be no stopping of the wheels of progress. Without it all is at a standstill."

"The investor, great and small, locks up his money and refuses to venture forth."

"There was a time not long ago before the present runaway, hit or miss, impulsive agitation began, that I would be called up on the telephone, say by Kuhn, Loeb & Co., say by Mr. Morgan's office, and in terms asked if I wanted to come in a syndicate, and a certain allotment of shares would be given to me, but I was also told that I would have to make immediate answer. If my reply was that I needed several days for consideration, the telephone receiver would be hung up in all likelihood. When I called several days later, and said I would go in the syndicate I would be curtly informed that I had lost my opportunity; that the syndicate had been completed."

Is Offered 7 Per Cent for Loan.

"What is the situation now? I am called and asked to participate in many syndicates, but in none of them is the time for decision fixed on the instant. I know they are content to await my decision, and I know there is no danger that I will be too late."

"I can judge in another way. Requests are coming to me today for money from quarters it was least expected would be asking for money some time ago. Today I was offered the unprecedented interest of 7 per cent for \$1,000,000, or \$2,000,000, or \$3,000,000. The security was beyond all criticism. That would be impossible in this country if there was confidence enough to unlock the money vault of the country."

"It is really of no great moment to me. I am through with business. Loss or gain no longer affects me. I am content as I am today. I am in better health than I have been for many years. I am happier than I have been for twelve years or more."

"Why are men making these offers to me now? It is because of a lack of confidence. Not a lack of confidence in the resources of the country, not because there is any danger of foreign entanglements, nor because of crop failures, nor of the monetary policy, nor of any social condition, but a lack of confidence in this administration."

ASKS RELIEF FOR THE PERSECUTED

Nordau Says Peace Not Possible Until Justice Is Done.

The Hague, Aug. 15.—The eighth international Zionist congress opened here today. Dr. David Wolffsohn, of Cologne, made the opening address. The attendance, which was large, included several delegates to the peace conference.

Dr. De Pinto, vice-president of the Dutch court of cassation, welcomed the Zionists on behalf of the Jewish community at The Hague.

The congress has acquired special interest, owing to its being inaugurated while the peace conference is in session, and also because of significant passages in the speeches of the Zionist orators, especially the statements made by Dr. Max Nordau, the president of the congress, regarding the peace conference.

Dr. Nordau said it was impossible to reach real, lasting peace without first securing justice for the subject or persecuted races, among which the Jews occupied the first place.

One of the Zionist delegates called attention to the "flaming enthusiasm of the Zionists," compared with the "indifferent, icy atmosphere of the peace conference," claiming that it showed how strong the racial and national feelings still are, and how far the world is from universal peace.

A FIERY MARRIAGE

Curious Sikh Ceremony Described in the Divorce Court.

London, Aug. 15.—A Sikh native marriage was described in the Divorce Court on Wednesday.

Miss Maria Carolina Birch was granted a decree of nullity of her marriage on the ground that Khan Singh Grewal had already gone through a Sikh child marriage when he was fifteen years of age.

Grewal was a law student at Lincoln's Inn when he met Miss Birch, and they went through a ceremony of marriage at a registry office, he representing himself as a widower.

Investigation showed that seven years before his English marriage Mr. Grewal, after the tribal custom of the Sikhs, had walked with a native bride round a large fire while a Hindoo official "etted the members."

This, said an expert witness, constituted a legal marriage among the Sikhs, who were not polygamists. A Sikh, however, it was stated, could have as many concubines as he could keep.

IMMUNITY FOR C. AND A. MEN

May Escape From Testifying Against the Standard Oil Company.

Washington, Aug. 15.—Announcement was made today by Attorney-General Bonaparte that an important conference will take place on Monday at the department of justice, in which the subject of the promise of immunity given to the Chicago and Alton Railroad officials given by District Attorney Morrison would be discussed. The Attorney-General said he understood that certain testimony and statements were to be presented to him, and would receive careful examination and consideration.

Attorney-General Bonaparte was asked if Judge Landis had replied to his letter informing him that Judge Morrison had made to the Chicago and Alton officials the promise of immunity in consideration of their furnishing evidence in the Standard Oil Company's case. He replied that he had not heard from Judge Landis.

"It may be noted, too," he added, "that Judge Landis did not publish my letter to him or the letters of District Attorney Morrison. Those letters state the attitude of the department of justice in the Chicago and Alton immunity matter, as we understand it now."

The Attorney-General declined to state what further action he intended to take against corporations which he believed to be violating the law.

COST OF AN ENGLISH GIRL

Mother of One Presented at Court Puts It at \$37,000 at the Age of 20.

London, Aug. 15.—The discussion of the cost of bringing up children, continues to go on in a lively manner. The most conspicuous contribution today is the experience of a woman, whose eldest daughter was presented at court this year. Her statement deals with a girl reared in such a home as that of the Eton and Oxford boy described previously, and represents that the daughter cost her parents in 20 years a grand total of £7,400, an average of £370 yearly.

The details show she cost £220 yearly for the first eight years, £280 for the next six years, while in her 16th, 17th and 18th years her annual cost was £470. The mother adds that her 19th and part of her 20th year were spent in Paris and Dresden at a cost of £750. The statement continues: "I then took a house in London for the season in order that she might be brought out and presented at court, an essential part of her education. I paid a dressmaker and milliner on her season account £580, a jeweler £340, a dressmaker £75, a collector £46, and in entertaining on her account probably £500."

THE KIEL RACES.

Kiel, Germany, Aug. 15.—The German Sonder Klasse yacht Wanne won today's race for the Emperor William's cup, beating the Marblehead, which was second, by one minute, twenty seconds.

The Wittelsbach, Chewink VIII, Spokane, and Tilly finished in the order named.

FINE FARM COUNTRY

So Says Surveyor of District North of Edmonton.

Edmonton, Alberta, Aug. 15.—Civil Engineer Ponton, who has been directed by the surveyor-general of Canada to run a line of the fifth meridian north some 200 miles from township 76, to which point Selly's survey carried the meridian in 1905, has returned here to meet his partner, Mr. Macbeth, of Macleod. Mr. Ponton treats the report that he was giving up the work of running the fifth meridian on account of difficulties encountered, notably black flies and mosquitoes, as a joke or canard, and says that his friends in the west who have known him 30 years will not believe such a story. On the other hand, Mr. Ponton says that the men are getting on well and that the horses are fat and sleek. He says he will have the line run the required distance by next March.

Mr. Ponton saw his provisions were not going to carry him through to Wabiscaw, and he had the alternative of going back to Athabasca Landing for his extra necessities.

Mr. Ponton says that the country through which he is running the line is fine farming country, where the soil is rich and deep, with sufficient grit in it to make it easy plow. From some points on the line he could see for 25 miles either way over a charming country covered with medium sized poplar.

LOBSTERS ON INCREASE

Work of Fish Commission Prevents Danger of Famine.

Washington, Aug. 15.—There is no danger of a lobster famine upon the Atlantic coast, according to views of United States Fish Commissioner George M. Bowers. Mr. Bowers expects through the work that has been done by the Government that this desirable shell fish will become more plentiful next year, and after that time the industry will be on a stable basis, which will enable the fishermen to supply the demands of the market without much difficulty.

Three years ago the commission began to supply young lobsters to the Atlantic coast fisheries in great quantities. The success of this propagation, it is stated, has been beyond the expectations of the commission. Young lobsters have enjoyed such a healthy growth on the Atlantic coast that this year the commission turned loose no less than 3,000,000 more in the waters of the Atlantic.

With the propagation of the last three years, Commissioner Bowers thinks that by next year the supply will fully satisfy all the demands of the shell fish trade. The commissioner says that when the figures of this year are ready for publication, it will be found that the work of the commission has been productive of surprising results.

STOLE AUTOS FOR GIRL

Des Moines Young Man Attempted to Play Millionaire Part.

Des Moines, Ia., Aug. 15.—Taking the chances of a long term in prison to discover by his sweetheart that he is not really a young millionaire, Robert Stevens, 19 years old, has been stealing automobiles nightly to take

the young woman for fast drives into the country. Stevens was arrested last evening just as he was starting out with a machine owned by H. M. Trisler.

Stevens was in the habit of taking the first automobile he could find without an owner, then taking a forty or fifty mile ride, with the girl. After his evening drive, Stevens would abandon the machine.

The thefts continued with regularity, and apparently the police were helpless until they discovered a bunch of sweet peas in the empty machine. In the bunch was one of a peculiar shade, which, it was found, was grown only in one garden in the city. Stevens was shadowed for several days by detectives until last night, when he was arrested.

OFF TO THE SOUTH POLE

Latest British Expedition Sails Under a White Flag.

London, Aug. 15.—The latest British expedition towards the South Pole left London on Tuesday, when the Nimrod sailed from the East India docks. It was announced that the King and Queen would visit the vessel when it calls at Cowes.

The Nimrod is an old sealer, and is well suited for work among the ice. The destination of the vessel is Port Lyttelton. There the travelers will bid farewell to civilization for many months. The "land party" are to be put ashore for twelve months, while the Nimrod, under Capt. England, carries on a series of scientific investigations along the ice fringe.

According to present plans it is intended that three of the land party shall go due south to the Pole, three due east, and three along a line between the course taken by the two other parties. Should all go well, the land party will have reunited at the base by Christmas, 1908, ready for the arrival of the Nimrod in January, 1909. Lieut. Shackleton feels great confidence in the motor car which forms part of the haulage should be greatly diminished. It has been subjected to most careful tests, and the experiments regarding the freezing of the petrol have proved encouraging. The expedition is well fitted out with scientific instruments, which have been lent by the Admiralty.

When the Nimrod went down the Thames on Tuesday, a white flag, the significance of which seemed to mystify the seafaring fraternity on the quay, waved from the foremast. An interesting fact is attached to this piece of cloth. According to shipping usage, the flag of the country to which the vessel is bound will generally be displayed at this point, and as the expedition will visit a veritable "no man's land," a white flag becomes necessary.

It is hoped that in future vessels making for the land in question will show the British flag.

TURNS ON HIS BETRAYER

Embezzling Teller Will Be Witness Against Woman Accomplice.

New York, Aug. 15.—Chester B. Runyan, the paying teller of the Windsor Trust Company, who stole \$95,000, will be the chief witness against Laura M. Carter, who betrayed him to the police after she had promised to hide him. She is to be put on trial next Wednesday for receiving stolen goods. Runyan says that he gave her \$15,000, and that she took \$10,000 more when he was not looking.

Runyan was brought before Judge Whitman in general session yesterday, and sentence was postponed at the request of Assistant District Attorney Marshall. Mrs. Carter's lawyers said she was ready for trial, and if she did not get it he would ask for a reduction of bail.
