

LIBERALS WILL NOT DELAY PASSING OF M.S.A. AMENDMENT

Caucus Held Today and Decisions Unanimous.

Ottawa, April 19.-Opposition members and senators were in caucus for two hours today to consider the line they will adopt in connection with the debate in both Houses this afternoon on the resolution to confirm and give parliamentary sanction to the amendments to the military service act contained in the recently-issued order-in-council When the caucus broke up at 1 o'clock, J. A. Robb, chief Liberal whip, said it had been unanimous. There was no disposition on the part of the Opposition, he said to prolong the debate, and it is expected that it will be concluded at today's sitting. Should there be a Liberal amendment it is likely to be one asking for the exemption of farmers from th ages of 20 and 23.


