WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 30.—Although a new effort for compromise ratification of the peace treaty is expected to follow closely the reconvening of Congress tomorrow, discussion among returning senators tonight revealed little

In the absence of information as to what President Wilson will recommend in his message to the new session, Republican and Democratic leaders in the senate were preparing to go ahead with long-deleyed general legislation.

It was agreed that even if the president asked that the fight for ratification be renewed at once, the work in that direction would be carried on privately in conferences in the opposing senate groups, while other business proceeded without interruption on the senate floor.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 30.—Another note to the Mexican Government relating to the arrest and imprisonment of William O. Jenkins, consular agent at Puebla, was sent by the state department today to the embassy at Mexico City for presentation tomorrow to Carranza.

The note, which some officials indicated might be the last on the subject, was in reply to Mexico's answer to a sharp demand by this Government for the immediate release of Jenkins. No intimation of the exact character of the note was revealed, but officials in touch with the situation believed it was more emphatic than any sent heretofore.

ROME, Nov. 30 .- (By the Associated Press.)-When King Victor Emmanuel enters the Chamber at the opening of the 25th session of Parliament at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning the Socialist deputies will not rise. They will leave the Chamber when the rollcall begins, and hold a meeting of the Socialist bloc in an adjoining room, while the king delivers his address. They will take the oath at Tuesday' session with mental reservations and present a motion to eliminate from the constitution the requirement that the deputies shall take such oaths. This
