WHAT'S IN A NAME

CLEMENTINA.
Clementina had its origin in ancient Rome. Clement was a cognomen and was borne by Vespasian's nephew, Titus Flavius Clement, who was put to death by Domitian on a charge of treason. Clementine was the name of a very early church at Rome dedicated to him, and he is thought by some to be the same Clement, taken as a Latin adjective, signifies "merciful"; from it the substantive Clementia came to be formed. The Romans worshipped Clementia, the personified virtue, as a goddess, bearing a cup in one hand and a lance in the other, and the title "Your Clementia" became the mode of addressing emperors. In England and France, Clementina is probably the direct outgrowth of the legend of St. Clement, who was martyred by being beheaded and thrown into the sea where a shrine of coral was formed round his head. He is the patron saint of sailors. Italian modernized the early Roman goddess by calling her Clementia, and Germany achieved widespread usage in honor of the Italian lady in "Sir C. Grandison." The turquoise is Clementine's talismanic stone. It will protect her from all dangers, particularly from accidents while riding and walking, according to an old legend. If she wears a new moon reflected in its surface, she will have extreme good luck. Monday is her lucky day and 3 her lucky number.

HELPFUL HINTS.

When baking apples individually, core them and fill spaces with chopped raisins or dates.

When the feet burn, bathe them daily with water in which there is a little bicarbonate of soda.

A wart may be removed without soreness by applications of oil of cinnamon three times a day.

Always fill a milk bottle with water in the moment it is emptied; it is much easier to fill than when it is empty.

Hard-boiled eggs are good served sliced with boiled codfish. A little dry mustard may be sprinkled on the fish, and the egg served with it.

To remove grease spots from silk, spread garment out, cover thoroughly with water and allow to remain at least an hour. Brush off, and if all grease signs have not disappeared, repeat the process.

When running dates, figs or raisins through the chopper, add a few drops of lemon-juice to prevent the fruit from clearing the chopper.

When you put the ferns and other house plants, put an iron nail in with the soil. It will keep the leaves a brilliant green color.

Use cranberry juice that has been cooled and is sprinkled on the fish, and the egg served with it.
