LESUEUR OFF COLOR WANDERERS WINNERS

Montreal Team Ran in Four
Goals in First Period—
Cleghorn Injured.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—It was a costly victory by which Wanderers tonight increased their lead in the race for the National Hockey Association title at the expense of the tail-enders, Toronto, by a score of 7 to 4. The victory cost Wanderers the services of Surge Cleghorn, the most brilliant defence player in the association, for two weeks at least. Cleghorn and Randall, a stocky Toronto defence player, met in a head-on collision in the second period, and crashed into the fence near the Toronto nets in a flying tangle of arms and legs. One of Randall's fingers was broken, and his face, opening a long gash, but that was the least of his injuries, for when he tried to get up, he fell back on the ice with a badly sprained ankle giving way beneath him. Cleghorn was carried off, and it will be two weeks at least before he can play again. With a long series of hard games facing them, the loss is a serious one for Wanderers, as the score might indicate. ONE GOAL WIN FOR SOLDIERS LONG SHOTS WON FIXTURE
