

TWO TORONTO CORPS ENLIST RECRUITS

Forty-eighth Now At Half-Strength—75th Reorganization Proceeding Well.

More than a hundred men were recruited last night at the armories by the 48th Highlanders, with Colonel C. W. Darling in command and Major J. E. Osborne second in command. Captain Carmichael stated to The World that the strength of the battalions was now about 800, or half the strength of the battalion when completely organized. The armories presented a very warlike and animated aspect during the evening, and this was enhanced by the presence of two bands, the regular one under the direction of Bandmaster Captain Slater, and the other, the pipe band, under Pipe-Major Fraser.

A mile away, at the site of the old Central Convalescent Hospital, 2200 St. George street, another famous Toronto unit, the 75th Battalion, enlisted a large number of recruits. Colonel Harbottle, the O. C., stated that organization of this battalion was about to begin in earnest. A parade was to be held next Wednesday at the headquarters, and on Wednesday, March 30, the 75th Battalion in conjunction with several other units in the city is to be reviewed by the G. O. C., General Williams, of military district No. 2.

Suffered Heavy Casualties. It is interesting to note that the 75th Battalion suffered a total of 3,167 casualties, 157 officers and 2,909 men during the war. During the same period, from the enlistment of the battalion to November 11, 1918, 6,000 men passed thru the orderly room as originals and reinforcements. A feature of the newly-organized unit in Toronto, under the direction of the department of militia, is the band of 33 pieces, under direction of Bandmaster Sylvester. Another band is the bugle band, under Bugle-Major Keilbreth. This band has 19 pieces in all, eight drummers and eleven buglers.

MINSTREL TREAT AT CHRISTIE ST.

Soldier Patients at Orthopaedic Hospital Enjoy Lively Program.

(Continued From Page 1). The paper should have gone further and said the two opposition groups should be held entirely responsible for the Farmers' hand. The Farmers had been taunted by Conservative Leader Ferguson, said Mr. Casselman of the U.F.O. forces, so he took it that that party could not be accused of doing too much talking.

J. Walter Curry thought there was more disposition to annoy the government of the house than to expedite business. He was the speaker of the house to expedite business.

G. C. Halcrow, the Labor leader, pleaded the opposition, both Liberal and Conservative, when he told their discussion of profit by taxation, shortening the session he would lengthen it. (Laughter.)

Liberal Leader Stewart said a deliberate attempt was being made to the part of newspapers to enforce dictation. If the government wanted to expedite business they were the up-down until long after the house had convened. The members of the house would not stand for such "gag" talk from any newspaper.

This closed the incident.

License Employes Dismissed. The attorney-general informed the Ontario license board that 27 employees of the Ontario license board had been dismissed since October 31, 1919, and a same number had resigned. He also informed the board that J. W. Lannin of the provincial police force received a pay day allowance besides his \$4,000 salary.

Hon. Benoit Bowman told the house in debate that the province had not purchased any licenses from anybody in Algonquin Park.

The minister told R. Hall that 51 employees of the province had been superannuated under the new act.

Harding Not Examined. Thru a misunderstanding, R. T. Harding, former crown counsel, was not examined by the public accounts committee yesterday. Conservative Leader Ferguson intimated that before Mr. Harding again takes the stand he will go on motion of the committee. Mr. Harding assented to the proposal.

Before adjourning, the committee, on motion of Col. Price and Hon. G. S. Henry, decided that L. C. Patkin of Dundas and others should be referred to the purchase of automobiles by the department of highways. The deputy minister of public works was also asked to be present. Maintenance and repair accounts for the parliament and government buildings are also to be probed on motion of Col. Price and G. S. Henry. Salaries of officials in the game and fisheries department are also to be examined into by the committee.

RUSO-POLISH TREATY IS SIGNED AT LAST

London, March 18.—The Russo-Polish treaty was signed at 9.30 o'clock tonight, says a despatch to The London Times from Riga. The despatch adds that it is to be ratified at Warsaw within thirty days.

POLES GIVE THANKS FOR CONSTITUTION

Revive an Old Custom and March in Parade to Ancient Cathedral.

Warsaw, March 18.—Thousands of Poles from all walks of life, reviving an old custom, today marched in a parade from the parliament building to the ancient cathedral, where they gave thanks for the constitution of the Polish Republic.

President Pilsudski, Premier Witos, and other government officials attended the ceremony, which was held in the cathedral, where the constitution of the Polish Republic was signed.

The cathedral service was the procession of the constitution of the Polish Republic, which was signed in 1918 after the retirement of Archbishop Gembinski.

The visit of Dorotheus to London was to make personal representations on behalf of the non-redeemed Greeks and the status of Constantinople at the recent near east conference. On Tuesday the archbishop rose from his sick bed to confer with Earl Curzon on the subject of the Greek question.

At the British secretary for foreign affairs, after the visit to the secretary, he steadily declined until death intervened.

ECUMENICAL PATRIARCH OF CONSTANTINOPLE DEAD

London, March 18.—Archbishop Dorotheus, the ecumenical patriarch of Constantinople, vice-president of the world alliance for promotion of international friendship thru churches, and former metropolitan of Brussels, died here tonight. He was 80 years of age. He was a member of the ecumenical patriarchate of Constantinople since 1918 after the retirement of Archbishop Gembinski.
