TRIAL BEGUN IN CASE OF CONSPIRACY AGAINST THE LIFE OF LLOYD GEORGE

Derby, Eng., Feb. 3.—The Guildhall was crowded today when Attorney-General Frederick E. Smith opened the case against the four persons accused of conspiracy to murder Premier David Lloyd George and Arthur Henderson, members of the war council.

The attorney-general referred to the prisoners as desperate, dangerous people, bitterly hostile to the country.

They were, he declared, shelterers of fugitives from the army who were doing their best to injure Great Britain in her present crisis. The prisoner Mason, he said, was a chemist of very considerable skill who had made a special study of poison and might be considered an expert in such a matter.

A sensation was created when the attorney-general alleged it had been intended to murder the premier by means of poisoned darts to be shot at him while he was playing golf at Walton Heath.

Both the premier and Mr. Henderson were to be killed, he charged, by means of poison contained in tubes sent from Mrs. Wheldon to an agent, employed by Mrs. Wheldon to an agent, who had ingratiated himself into her good favors.
