Stations

Greater encouragement was given to those interested in the recruiting campaign by yesterday's figures, nineteen men having enrolled during the day. The speakers last night included Sergt. Knight of the Gordon Highlanders, Capt. H. H. Smith, Pte. and Rev. M. E. Conron, Rev. Dr. Morrison and Lieut. A. J. Brooking, selections were given by the Temple band, recitations by A. W. Baird, and a short introduction by the chairmen, E. A. Schofield. A meeting for men only was held in the Imperial Theatre after 10 o'clock and was most successful.

Citizens Committee

The citizens' committee on recruiting in the board of trade rooms yesterday spent an hour and a half discussing recruiting arrangements. Sergt. Knight, in response to an inquiry from C. F. Sanford, Lieut.-Colonel Armstrong said that Colonel Campbell had authorized as many as 1,600 men at Sussex, so that there need be no fear of any recruits being unassigned.

Why the Underwater Warfare Slackens

London, Sept. 8.—The Daily News says, in a leading article:

"The more closely Count von Bernstorff's note is scrutinized, the less satisfactory it appears. His concession is not merely a capitulation at the bayonet point; it is a concession whittled down till it becomes almost studied insolence; yet even so, it is an advertisement to the world of hopeless and conclusive failure.

The capitulation to America is sufficiently explained. Germany may have replaced her lost submarines; she cannot replace their crews—officers and men whom only years can train for underwater warfare are lost to Kiel and Wilhelmshaven and Zebruge. If the sword is sheathed it is because the edge is turned and blunted.

The English language is to be substituted for German in most of the commercial schools of Russia as one of the compulsory subjects of the curriculum.
