HARBOR TUG IS SUNK AND TWO SHIPS DAMAGED

Steamer Lingan Runs Amuck While Getting Ready To Leave
TUG WASSON SUNK IN MARKET SLIP
Keith Cann and Canadian Victor Struck By Collier In Harbor

THE DOMINION Coal Company steamer Lingan, Captain Re-side, ran amuck while leaving port yesterday afternoon, and the ship not only received damage, but sank the tug Wasson, did damage to the coastwise steamer Keith Cann and the C. G. M. steamer Canadian Victor, and caused considerable excitement along the harbor front for about half an hour.

The Lingan was in ballast and, being high in the water, a southwest wind took charge of the steamship. The Lingan's stern swung with great force against the tug Wasson, which was moored at the end of the South wharf. With a loud crash the Lingan crushed the tug against the face of the wharf. Every pane of glass in the tug's wheelhouse was broken and the house damaged and her signal mast was broken off short at the roof of the house. In addition to badly straining the hull of the tug, it is believed that the Lingan's propeller cut the side of the Wasson open.

CREW JUMP QUICKLY.
The crew of the Wasson were obliged to jump quickly to the wharf for safety as it was thought that the tug would be crushed by the heavy steamship. Immediately it was learned that the Wasson was making water rapidly. Her lines were let go and with considerable difficulty she was hauled round the corner of the wharf into the Market Slip for the purpose of grounding her.

KEITH CANN HIT.
The starboard end of the Lingan's bridge caught the upper deck railing of the Keith Cann and smashed a section of it as well as tearing away a part of her hurricane deck.

After leaving the Keith Cann damaged, the Lingan continued on her way down the harbor front. Fortunately the ferry steamer was out of the east side dock and escaped being hit. Clearing the McAvity wharf the Lingan scraped along the side of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Victor at the McLeod wharf, and before the uncontrolled Lingan was brought to a stop the bridge caught the upper railing of the Victor and smashed a section of it.

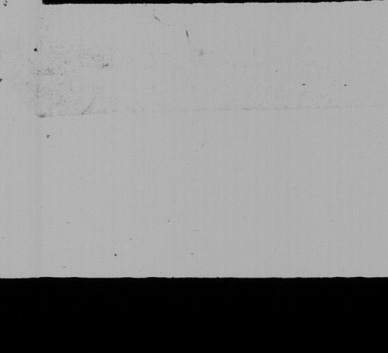
ASSISTANCE ARRIVES.
By the time the screaming of the Lingan's and the Ocean Hawk's whistles for assistance were answered by the tug Ocean Opney, which received a line from the steamer and soon the Lingan was hauled out in the harbor, was turned and then steamed on.

The Lingan was stopped for a few minutes near the mouth of the harbor, the tugs cast off their hawsers and the collier steamed round the eastern end of Partridge Island and continued on her voyage to Louisbourg, C. B.

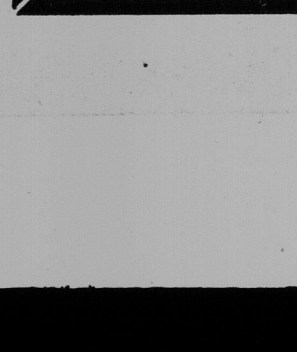
