

## MAYOR LOOKS TO GOVERNMENT

Comments on Statement in Ottawa on Tri-Partite Agreement

Says C. P. R. and City Waiting For Some Time For Government to Take Action.

"Well let them go ahead and carry out their part of the bargain" said Mayor Potts this morning when his attention was called to a statement by Hon. J. H. King, Minister of Public Works, in the House of Commons yesterday that it was the intention of the Government to carry out the Tri-Partite agreement for the providing of terminal facilities on the West Side. His Worship said the City and the C. P. R. had been waiting some time for the government to carry out its part of the contract as both had gone as far as they could until the retaining wall called for in the contract had been built and this was to be undertaken by the Government as part of their work under the agreement. There was nothing in the way of the Government starting work at once and he hoped they would do more than say it was their intention to carry out the bargain, he said.

### M. P. QUERIES

The matter was brought up in Parliament by Dr. Murray MacLaren, C. M. G., one of the representatives of Saint John-Albert, who asked if it was the intention of the government to carry out the Tri-Partite agreement made between the Federal Government, the Canadian Pacific Railway and the City of Saint John, for the purpose of developing terminal transportation facilities on the west side of the harbor.

## 5 FROM SAINT JOHN SAIL FOR ENGLAND

Wm. T. Tyner of Postal Staff on European Tour—Lawyers Away.

William T. Tyner of the postal service here is away on what promises to be a delightful period of travel. He left last evening for Montreal, there to join a touring party and sail on the S. S. Doric of the White Star Dominion line for England. That country, Ireland, Scotland, Belgium and France will be visited and a tour of some of the battlefields of the western front in the Great War. Mr. Tyner expects to be home again in about six weeks.

Passengers on the Doric also will be Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and J. H. A. Fairweather, K. C., who, as before announced, are going to England to appear before the Privy Council in an insurance case. A. D. Gilbert, who also is in this case, will be sailing from Montreal on the S. S. Montroyal today to appear before the Privy Council. Another passenger on the Doric will be Alfred Stretton, of Saint John.

## ORANGEMEN PLAN PARADE AT SUSSEX

Celebration Will Take Place on Saturday, July 11—Speeches to Follow.

At Sussex the Orange Lodges of Kings East will celebrate July 12 under the auspices of Admiral Nelson L. O. L. No. 124. Besides the Kings county lodges it is expected that large delegations from Petticoe, Salisbury, Iton and Saint John will be in a procession to be held. It is expected that two brass bands will take part in the parade. The S. A. A. C. field has been secured for the day and the procession will disband there, after which speeches will take place. The Protestant churches of Sussex have expressed their intention of serving meals. This, with hotels and restaurants, should everybody being well looked after. As July 12 falls on Sunday this year the celebration will be held on Saturday, July 11.

## PLANNING WALKS ABOUT MEMORIAL

Commissioner Frink and City Forester Gould Arrange For Work in King Square.

Commissioner Frink and H. E. Gould, city forester, paid a visit to King Square this morning and considered plans for arranging the ground round the War Memorial. It has been decided to make several walks from the main paths to allow persons to get a close view of the monument and to plant shrubs and place some flower beds in the surrounding ground. It is the intention at present, the commissioner said, to leave a path around the base of the monument so that anyone desiring to do so might place a wreath on the memorial without treading on the grass plots.

### SKULL NOT FRACTURED

George S. Enos, Imperial Theatre's chief operator, who fell to the pavement while working on the outside light standards yesterday morning, is in an improved condition today. X-ray photographs do not indicate any fracture of the skull, and the young man's escape from fatal injuries is regarded as remarkable. Mr. Enos is suffering chiefly from cuts and bruises about his body from the fall to the cement pavement, and the tumbling of two hundred pounds of metal lamp fixtures upon his body as he lay prone.

## TELLS OF MISSING 45 SUITS FROM SHOP

Manager of Union Street Store Gives Evidence in Theft Case.

Preliminary hearing into the theft charge against Frederick Martin and Charles Connell, was commenced in the police court this morning before Magistrate Henderson. Following the evidence of Abraham Milner, manager of Marquison & Keith's store, Union street, at which the theft was committed last February, the case was set over until Monday afternoon. J. Starr (The appearance of Martin, and A. Bridges for Connell.

Mr. Milner said the break occurred on the night of Saturday, Feb. 14. He had locked the front door and had left a light burning. Returning on Sunday to turn out the light, he found a window in the rear of the shop broken and about 45 suits of clothes and a few suitcases missing, the total value being about \$1,000. He notified the police. He said he had never seen these men before. He identified a few suits in court as coming from his store. Detective Sergeant Power, who conducted the prosecution, said he had one important witness coming, and as soon as he arrived, the case could be concluded.

## BOARD OF TRADE ON HOME BANK RELIEF

Text of Resolution of Protest, Which is Being Sent to Ottawa and Elsewhere.

The Saint John Board of Trade, after considering the proposed relief to the depositors of the defunct Home Bank of Canada, has adopted the following resolution on the subject:

"Whereas the Dominion Government, at the expense of the whole country, is now contemplating the reimbursement of the depositors of the defunct Home Bank of Canada, which reimbursement involves approximately the sum of \$5,000,000; and  
"Whereas such an expenditure of federal monies has no parallel in the annals of the Dominion and is liable to establish a dangerous and otherwise undesirable precedent;  
"Therefore be it resolved that the Saint John Board of Trade do tender a respectful protest against the principle of the expenditure of federal monies upon the reimbursement of the depositors of the defunct Home Bank of Canada (more especially as the operations of the said bank were almost wholly restricted merely to a small section of Canada)."

"Further, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Premier, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King; Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance; Senator J. W. Daniel; Hon. J. B. M. Baxter and Dr. Murray MacLaren, and to the leading members of the Board of Commerce throughout the Maritime Provinces."


