MANY FROM HERE TO SEE THE GAMES MANY TO A.O.H. CONVENTION

That is the Outlook if World's Championships Are Played in Boston

It is a sure thing that if the world's championship baseball games are at Boston, and according to the talk the Red Sox have the American league pennant clinched, St. John will be well represented at the matches. Last year when the games were in Philadelphia a good many St. John fans were among those in attendance, and when the games are in Boston the representation will be very much larger. It is understood that several local fans have written to the management for reservations for the games, but as yet there has been nothing arranged in that matter, as it will be very likely handed over to the National Commission on account of the trouble with the tickets last year. The championship games this year will likely be started in the Fall or about October 10, according to calculations. Joe Page who was in the city yesterday, and who is in attendance at most of the championship series, intends making the trip this year.

LOCAL NEWS

EVERY DAY CLUB BICYCLE RACE. The Every Day Club will conduct its twenty-mile bicycle race early in October. It is hoped to have at the same time a ten mile road race. The bicycle race will begin and end at a point on the Marsh Road near the old athletic grounds, to avoid the danger of street traffic.

CITY LUMBER TARIFF. The common council by order on August 12 placed the full top-wharfage charge on lumber during the summer months, the same as in winter. REGALLS MURDER OF GIRL BY MUNROE. One of Principal Witnesses Against Him in City This Week After Forty Years Absence

Among the visitors to the city this week were Mr. and Mrs. Bunker, residents of Maine. Mr. Bunker was formerly of Loch Lomond. He had not been in St. John for forty years, and naturally everything looked new to him on his arrival. He was greatly impressed with the improvements which have taken place since his last visit here. Mr. Bunker will be remembered as one of the principal witnesses at the Munroe murder trial. His uncle at that time was the proprietor of Bunker's hotel at Loch Lomond, almost directly opposite the place where the new Ben Lomond House now stands. Munroe, then a Ben Lomond, stayed at this house. The murder took place on the Black River road and the place is still marked by a small piece of white cloth hanging on a tree in front of the spot where Munroe killed a girl. Munroe, it will be remembered, was hung in the courtyard here. Mr. Bunker left for home today.

REFERRED TO COMMISSION. Matter of John E. McDonald—Other Cases in Court Today

In the matter of John E. McDonald, lunatic not so found, an order was made this morning by Mr. Justice McLeod in Chancery Division to have the matter of his sanity referred to a commission. The affidavits of Dr. W. W. White and Dr. G. A. B. Addy as to the condition of Mr. McDonald before he left St. John were read this morning. J. A. Barry appeared for the petitioner, Mrs. Isabelle McBerry, and Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C. W. J. Mahoney and C. H. Ferguson also appeared for interested parties. Argument took place this morning before Mr. Justice McLeod in the case of Tilly vs. Howell, to the taxation of costs. The court considers Geo. H. V. Belyea appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. L. Currier for the defendant. Hearing in the matter of the A. E. Hamilton Co., Ltd., in liquidation was this morning further adjourned until next Tuesday, and hearing in the matter of the Francis Kerr Co., Ltd., was further adjourned until next Friday. Hearing was continued in the winding up of the Nepesquit Lumber Company, Limited. The matter was adjourned until September 8th.

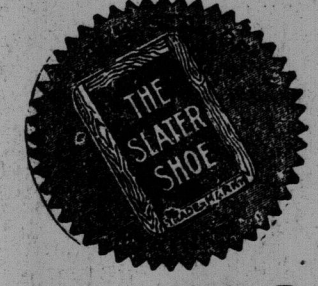
