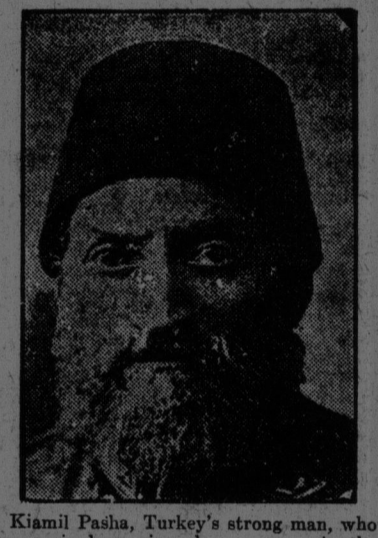

## MONTENEGRINS BEAT TURKS AGAIN AND CAPTURE FORT

### Victory of Yesterday Followed By Another After Fourteen Hour Fight

Several Times Repulsed, But Finally Carry Position—Great Loss on Both Sides—Turkey Has 400,000 Men Available—Position of Christians in Ottoman Empire

Podgoritz, Montenegro, Oct. 11—The Montenegrin troops followed up their success in capturing Detich mountain from the Turks, also taking late last evening, the Turkish fort which dominates the town of Tushi from Schipinick Hill. The Turks offered a most stubborn resistance, but the Montenegrins succeeded in rushing the position after prolonged fighting. Several hours assault by the Montenegrins were repulsed by the Turks before they were finally overcome.
