

PRESBYTERY DEALS WITH CALLS TO MINISTERS

Several calls to ministers were dealt with at the meeting of the Presbytery of St. John yesterday. A call to Rev. D. MacOdrum, of St. John's church, Moncton, from Calvin Church, Pembroke, Ont., was supported by Rev. George D. Campbell, clerk of the presbytery of Lunenburg and Hants, and Walter Byles and F. J. Munro on behalf of the Pembroke church. Owen Cameron, W. J. MacBeth, Dr. H. S. Thomas and W. G. Jones of Moncton expressed the desire of the Moncton congregation to have Mr. MacOdrum remain. Mr. MacOdrum announced his intention of accepting and will leave Moncton on December 21. Rev. Gordon Dickie was appointed interim moderator.

A call from Plaster Rock and Three Brooks to Rev. J. L. King of Buctouche was presented by Rev. G. Pringle and Donald Fraser. Mr. King accepted and will be inducted on January 2.

Calvin church, St. John, extended a call to Rev. F. W. Thompson, late of Bridgeport, N. S. The call was approved and ordered forwarded.

Rev. Robert Dewar of Vancouver, Manitoba, has accepted a call to St. James Church, Milltown, and will be inducted on December 18.

A resolution approving the proposals for the establishment of a Maritime Home for Girls was adopted.

Recommendations were made by the augmentation committee that grants should be made from the augmentation fund as follows:

To St. George and Beacoe \$250
St. James, Milltown 800
Sackville and Dorchester 300
Also that \$175 be granted to Rev. James Colhoun and \$225 to Rev. R. J. Miller to cover their travelling expenses from Ireland last year.

During the afternoon session, Rev. J. A. Springour, returned missionary from British Guiana, came in and was cordially greeted by his friends. He has been in the field for five years and has just returned from a vacation. It is expected that he will remain a few months.

James Robinson, of the Hotel Miramichi, was yesterday sentenced by Magistrate Malby to a month in jail with option of fine as a charge of selling liquor in Newcastle. His hotel was raided last night from the police force and also as Scott Act Inspector following a controversy with members of the police committee with respect to the enforcement of the Scott Act.

ON MAIL TRIP 2,100 MILES INTO THE NORTH

Four Hudson's Bay Company Men Start on Perilous Journey

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 10.—Four trusted employees of the Hudson's Bay company, which has opened a new trading post since 1899, accompanied by two mail and provisions, are on the way to Fort McPherson, 2,100 miles north of here, on what is conceded to be the longest overland mail trip in the world. They are scheduled to reach the fringe of the Arctic Circle on February 28, the journey occupying about sixty days.

The trip from Edmonton to Athabasca, 100 miles, was made by train. On the first day, after which the party started on the lonely trail, which follows the windings of the Athabasca River and Mackenzie river. One of the teams, with two men, is destined to Fort McPherson, the other going to Fort McPherson. They are experienced river and woods men, who have passed years in the north country.

Included in the mail is a small packet for Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, to be delivered at Herschel Island, the most northerly mail point in Canada.

"The winter trip to Fort McPherson is fraught with great danger," said Acting Postmaster Cairns, "but we feel confident that the men will get through, as they know all conditions of the country."

ENGLISH CLUBS WILL DISTRIBUTE MILLIONS

Old Country Customs Brings Christmas Cheer to Members From Own Savings.

London, Dec. 10.—The provident state clubs of the country will distribute about \$7,000,000 this Christmas, \$750,000 of which will be paid out in London.

These clubs are a remarkable feature of English life, many of them having histories which go back for many years. As a sample, one of the clubs at Wolverhampton is more than a century old. Twenty-one years ago the London New Tabernacle club was founded with fifty members, and the first Christmas thereafter it distributed \$200. Now it has a membership of 16,000, and on the fifteenth instant will distribute \$88,750. This will make a total distribution in the club's history of \$600,000, after the payment of \$200,000 in sick and death benefits since its formation, and even then it has a reserve of \$75,000.

NEW SUBMARINE

Strict Secrecy Marks Construction of Extraordinary Craft.

London, Dec. 8.—The Admiralty is preserving the strictest secrecy regarding the construction of a new submarine which is declared to be as superior to previous submarines as the dreadnought was to the pre-dreadnoughts. Apparently a knowledge of its powers and the experts who declare that "Dreadnoughts will soon be out of date." It is believed that the new submarine will have a speed of more than twenty knots with a wide radius of action. It will have wireless equipment and its guns will be far superior to the armament of the present destroyers. In fact, the new submarine is expected to revolutionize naval warfare.

The Mexican congress has nullified the presidential elections, and has called for new elections to be held in July, 1914. This will mean that, unless something intervenes, Huerta will continue in office until then and possibly until September, that period of time being regarded before he must quit, even if not elected.
