NEW YORK SKYSCRAPPERS. Business Transacted in Rooms Giving View of Hudson.

William Archer writes in the Westminster Gazette, London:

The miscellany skyscraper—the high building—is not a monstrosity, but a thing of great imagination and, sometimes ugly, no doubt, but more often truly grandiose and colossal. It first came into being, for topographical reasons, in the congested toe of Manhattan Island; but in a modified form, it is certain to spread through out all great cities. I do not mean that such windy canyons as lower Broadway and Wall Street will rise in London and Paris, but that in all populous places great islands of beautiful architecture will stand out above the sea of ordinary five and six-story houses.

The typical New York office building has enormous advantages. Go to see a publisher or a lawyer in London, and you find him installed in stuffy, dusty, unsanitary chambers, perhaps in a converted dwelling house of the 18th century, or two such dwelling houses inconveniently run together—at all events, in a dingy, rabbit-warren of a place. In New York you are shut up in a converted office building, a business block, a skyscraper, a building which is a masterpiece of modern architecture, a building which is a masterpiece of modern architecture, a building which is a masterpiece of modern architecture.

If, on the other hand, your visit is to a publisher, you pass along no corridor, for the probability is that the elevator lands you right in his waiting room. He probably occupies one whole floor of the great building—half an acre of glass-partitioned space—a busy hive of multifarious industry. It is comfortably heated in winter, admirably ventilated in summer; the grubbiest and stuffiest of London are entirely absent. The publisher's own sanctum is probably in a corner, with magnificent views in two directions over the endless expanse of the city, with its cliffs of masonry and its countless planes of white steam. Air and sunshine penetrate everywhere—glorious sunshine being amazingly prevalent in New York.

Business has not out of its grime and housed itself in the blue spaces of the sky. And we make it our foolish pride, that we are earth-bound, and boast of our resolute proximity to the gutter!

People often ask why the practical Americans use four syllables to designate an appliance which we denote by the single syllable—lift. This is at first paradoxical; but after a few days in America you realize that the two words are admirably appropriate to two very different things. The American elevator for exhilarating elevates; the British lift laboriously lifts. I confess to taking great delight in the swift, sensible machines that rush you up in the twinkling of an eye to the twentieth floor of a great hotel or business building. They are to the crawling, dithering, British lift as a new-horse to a pack-mule. The time of mind which professes to shrink in horror from such achievements of "mechanical civilization" is one of the innumerable phases of the Great Stupidity.

But "elevator architecture," though the most prominent feature of New York and other American cities, is not the only evidence of the constructive genius of the race. In every type of building America leads the world. The finest railway stations in Europe—Frankfurt, Cologne and the Paris Gare d'Orléans—are paltry in comparison with those vast palaces of marble and travertine the Pennsylvania and the Grand Central terminals, with the Union station at Washington not far behind them. Each is a city in itself.

BIG DECLINE IN DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS

(Boston Globe.)

State Health Commissioner Eugene R. Kelley announced today that during the past four years there has been a decline of more than 30 per cent in the number of deaths from tuberculosis.

The health commissioner's statement was made in connection with a review of the six months ending June 30, 1921, as compared with similar periods in 1920, 1919 and 1918.

During the six months of 1918 there were 2670 deaths from tuberculosis; in 1919 for the first six months in 1920, 2178 and for the first six months this year 1817.

The decrease, Commissioner Kelley says, may be characterized as "dividends from the twenty-five years' campaign against the disease in this state." The commissioner, in this connection, paid a tribute to the late Dr. William J. Gallivan, a pioneer in the fight against the "white plague." Until his death, some weeks ago, Dr. Gallivan was director of the division of tuberculosis in the State Department of Public Health.

"To Dr. Gallivan belongs almost all the credit for bringing the disease under control," said Commissioner Kelley. "It was he who conceived the measure by which the 'white plague' must be fought, and who aroused the leaders in the medical profession and the state authorities to the urgency of the situation."

"The construction of the Rutland State Sanatorium, one of the first of its kind in the country, if not in the world, was one of the results of his work, and the development later of the sanatoria method of treating the disease; the compulsory establishment of municipal and county tuberculosis hospitals, the education of the public concerning the disease and the establishment of tuberculosis clinics, all were mainly due to his enthusiastic and unabating efforts."

Commissioner Kelley also praised the work of Dr. Alfred Worcester at present head of the Massachusetts Medical Society and who was also one of the pioneers, he said, in the movement.

The enactment of laws protecting the health of industrial workers, Dr. Kelley said, was also the outcome of the campaign against tuberculosis, and contributed toward preventing the spread of the disease.

"Measures limiting the hours of labor of women and children; guarding against unhealthy conditions in factories, such as the elimination of dust, the admittance of light and air, improvement of sanitary facilities, all played their part in bringing about the great improvement," he said.

London, Sept. 9.—Infuriated women attacked three rent collectors during their rounds at Eltham, where tenants are on strike. One collector was badly hurt. None of them succeeded in gathering any rents.

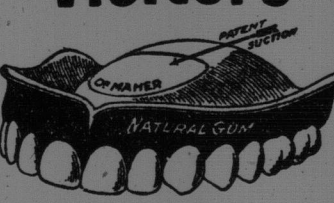
