TO ENLARGE SCOPE

Rate Enquiry Will Be Widened, Says Chairman Drayton.

IT MAY AFFECT THE EAST

An Increase of Railway Tariffs In the Eastern End of the Dominion Is Within the Range of Possibility—Counsellor Representing Lines Say Water Competition Here Explains Difference In Charges.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—With an effort of the railroads to show that not only were their eastern rates lower by water competition which was absent in the west, but that numerous reductions had been made in rates as regards the latter as well, the western rate enquiry was opened yesterday morning by the Railway Commission, and continued in the afternoon. It will probably last all week.

That the scope of the enquiry would be enlarged so as to include more than the mere question of discrimination, was the important announcement of Chairman Drayton.

Although the enquiry has to do primarily with western rates, it is of interest to the east, inasmuch as one result of it might be a raising of eastern tariffs as well as a possible lowering of those affecting territory nearer the Pacific ocean.

Probably the largest array of counsel and representatives of the various bodies interested ever seen in any single case before the Railway Commission was present. The many railway men included G. M. Bosworth, vice-president of the C.P.R.; Sir William Mackenzie of the C.N.R., and J. E. Dalrymple, vice-president of the G.T.R.

Mr. M. K. Cowan represented the interests of Alberta and Saskatchewan, and Mr. A. McDonald, British Columbia.

For the Federal Government appeared Mr. James Bicknell, K.C., of Toronto; Mr. H. W. White, K.C., of Winnipeg; Mr. Morrison of Vegreville, Alta., and G. E. Carpenter of Winnipeg.

Mr. Isaac Pitblado looked after the interests of the Winnipeg Board of Trade, and Mr. J. E. Walsh those of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

F. H. Chrysler, K.C., for the C.P.R., said the company did not admit that the interests of any one section were sacrificed to another. The public was protected, within the meaning of the clause of the railway act governing the matter and he promised to submit evidence showing that western rates were not unjust.

"Is there anyone connected with the C.P.R. who could tell me the water competition actually amounts to?" "In tonnage?" "No."

G. M. Bosworth said that western rates were chiefly based on the rates in Quebec and Northern Pacific Railway rates and were not affected by water competition.

Quebec and Maritime Province rates were governed chiefly by St. Lawrence River competition as well as by the I.C.R. The C.P.R. did a large amount of business east and west in the United States, receiving this business from the other lines originally at St. Thomas and now at Windsor and Detroit.

Much iron and coal is also carried from the eastern States westward by the C.P.R. at rates the same as those over American roads. American grain, when Canadian grain was not seeking transport, was carried to St. John for export, but the Canadian was given the preference. The local American rates had a large bearing on through rates from one country to another. Rates in the western States were higher than in the east.

Cross-examined by Hon. E. H. Phlippen for the G.N.R., Mr. Bosworth said there was no other district in the world where railways were up against so much water competition as in eastern Canada and rates had been based on it. In fact, he declared, the G.T.R. to make higher rates in winter to get away from this, but it had been prevented by an order of the board. There was no water competition in the west.

At the afternoon session Vice-President Bosworth of the C.P.R. was re-cross-examined by Isaac Pitblado for the Winnipeg Board of Trade, and stated that the rates between two inland points would probably not be affected by water competition. The whole Western Ontario peninsula, however, he declared, would be affected. In fact, the C.P.R. had a standard mileage tariff applicable to the whole of Eastern Canada, irrespective of individual cases of water competition.

Mr. Pitblado examined the witness in regard to his statement that St. Paul and Fort William, instead of Windsor, should be compared. He then returned to the question of water competition, which was thoroughly considered.

Mr. McInnes was next called and gave evidence as to a number of rate reductions made by the C.P.R. at different times in its eastern and western rates. The reductions as regards grain rates, etc., had in some cases been as high as 60 per cent., while there had also been considerable reductions in coal, coke and a number of other commodities.

D. H. Reynolds New Inspector. Ottawa, Oct. 8.—D. H. Reynolds of Ottawa has been appointed traveling immigration inspector. He is well known in sporting circles and has frequently acted as referee in big lacrosse matches. He has been on the staff of The Citizen for the past twenty-five years.

Tank Fell on Workman.

Kingston, Oct. 8.—Joseph Ahern received serious injuries at the locomotive works, when a large tank fell on him, crushing him under its weight. His right arm was broken and his legs and arms badly bruised.

STRIKE IN CABINET

Sir Wilfrid Explains Dilatory Methods of Government.

VISIT TO MOUNT FOREST

Old Chief Completes His Tour of Ontario With a Triumph In Which Thousands of Visitors Flood the Town and Participate in an Enthusiastic Torchlight Procession—Rink Was Packed.

Mount Forest, Oct. 8.—The rink here which seats forty-five hundred, was twice filled to suffocation, while the Town Hall, which was also requisitioned for an overflow meeting, was crowded to the doors, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke in Mount Forest yesterday.

The thousands who could be accommodated in either resolved themselves into a series of voluntary processions, and paraded the streets repeating in rhythmic tones their slogan, "All Returning to Laurier." Many ladies were taking part in these processions carrying Union Jacks.

The Liberal Chief was in unusually brilliant form, evidently inspired by the marked evidences of affection and loyalty to himself and the old cause which greeted him at every turn.

Dealing with the Government's course toward the C.P.R., he said: "They have been in office twelve months next Thursday, and what have they done. They have done nothing, and they can't do anything, because Mr. Borden has such a balky team. Mr. Monk kicks or Mr. Foster roars. Neither whip nor spur, kicks nor cuffs will make them go. The C.P.R. stock shareholders' melon was shown to have been issued because of the difficulty arising out of the 'balky' team. The C.P.R.'s petition to issue new stock was ignored at the last Cabinet meeting, and when the C.P.R. meeting occurred the other day they went ahead and announced the issue of \$60,000,000 worth of stock at \$175 without waiting any longer for the Government's procrastinated decision, but the Government's excuse was that they had not yet considered the question."

"What is the use of a Government like that?" In concluding his address in the rink at night, he said that just before the general election of last year he had told his wife that he expected to win, but that if he lost he would retire, so that they could spend their days together quietly. However, when defeat came Lady Laurier told him that he must go on, and he was now enjoying himself more as a critic of the Government than he ever had as its leader. His one regret was that Canada suffered by the change.

Peace Terms Satisfactory.

Rome, Oct. 8.—A majority of the Italian people seem to be well satisfied with the conditions under which peace between Italy and Turkey has been arranged. A minority protest against the peace terms, but, first, that the present terms in no wise differ from those offered by Italy a year ago, and they maintain that Turkey deserves to be in the hands of the victors, and secondly, because of the return to Turkey of the Aegean Islands, which they contend should be retained by Italy or turned over to Greece. Finally, they point out that Turkey's object in concluding peace at the present time is to clear the way for the Balkan difficulty.

The opponents of the peace settlement are believed to be aiming at the Cabinet with the hope of disrupting it, but Premier Giolitti appears to have a strong grip on affairs.

Killed Wife and Himself.

Calgary, Oct. 8.—Crushed through jealousy and inability to effect reconciliation with his wife, John C. Davis, a realty operator, fired three bullets into her body, killing her instantly. An effort was made to fatally wound Miss Mabel Dixon, a private detective, and then ended his own life shortly after seven o'clock Sunday night. The tragedy occurred at Miss Dixon's apartment.

The triple shooting was the culmination of troubles covering a period of more than a year. Unable to convince himself of his wife's fidelity, Davis employed a detective to follow her about the city and to furnish him with detailed reports of her actions and places she visited. Sympathy for the woman, he declared, drove him to betray her trust, and later she brought Mrs. Davis to her home to live.

\$2,000.00 for Missing Man.

St. John, N.B., Oct. 8.—By advertisement and by aid of the police throughout Canada, search has been begun for George Taylor of Kimball, N.B., in order to put in his hands two million dollars from the estate of his father, who died a year ago in St. John.

The man sought for left home twenty years ago, and not a word of him has been had since.

Another Power Merger.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Oct. 8.—An announcement was made yesterday that the Niagara Lockport and Ontario Power Co., American distributing agent of the Ontario Power Co., of this city, had obtained control of the Salmon River Power Co.

The latter company's generating plant will be used to obviate the necessity of constructing a second transmission line from this city to Rochester and Syracuse.

Four Months For Smuggling Chinese.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Oct. 8.—Four months in the Erie County penitentiary was the sentence meted out to Bart G. Blom of Buffalo in the U. S. District Court on the American side when he pleaded guilty to the charge of smuggling Chinese across the Niagara frontier.
