They cannot see why men in St. John's can be given work for relief purposes breaking rocks, at the expense of the outport taxpayer, when they cannot get work. The jobs which are given work, and some of them, according to the report of the police Court proceedings, spend some of it in booze. One earned \$15.00 last week and gave his wife \$3.00 and when she complained he knocked her down and otherwise ill-used her.

The trial of Charles R. Tuff, who killed a 4 year old Mollie Humphries, by his motorcycle in July 1923, took place in the Supreme Court on Monday morning, Jan. 28. Several witnesses were called and examined. The jury through their foreman, Mr. Joseph Peters announced that they had found the prisoner "not guilty." He was then discharged.

A social evening was spent in Cable Hall on Wednesday last. A large number enjoyed a rare programme of violin and mandolin music. Special mention might be made of Mr. J. Hayward, whose musical talent was much appreciated.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

Section 137 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1906, says:—

No person shall establish install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Newfoundland except under and in accordance with a license granted by the Post Office.

Forms for Amateur License may be obtained at office of Minister of Posts & Telegraphs, St. John's, and call signals furnished and recorded.
