THE INTERCOLONIAL FREIGHT TARIFF
The efforts of Mr. Chas. H. Fairweather at Ottawa for the amendment and the freight tariff of the Intercolonial Railway, which was issued on the 25th July last, have been so far successful that the order in council has been issued providing for the following changes in that document.

1st. That as regards agricultural products a special farmers' tariff on grain products be issued.

2nd. That the present rate on straw at the rate of the railway be maintained, but when carried as a separate risk they be reduced to the old rate.

3rd. That the tariff on small lots of grain be reduced to the old rate, and the tariff on large lots be increased to the old rate.

THE LARGEST QUESTION

There seems to be a general agreement among employers that some measure should be granted to the working men with regard to the hours of labor, but there are differences as to the details.

Some employers are willing to concede the nine hours day while others desire their men to continue to work a half holiday on Saturday, so that the men will be free at noon on that day.

As regards the time question, the working men have their five hours of some use to them. The majority of the working men, however, prefer the shorter day to the half holiday, although to us it seems unwise.

The half holiday system has been found to be a very good one. It has been tried, and we think it would be found to be a very good one here also.

It has been a feature in other countries for a long time. It would be well, we think, for working men to give the matter their serious consideration, for whatever arrangements are made now will probably continue in force for some time.

It has been suggested in connection with the proposed Saturday half holiday that it would be well to make Thursday the pay day, and this idea is one worthy of a good one.

If Thursday were made the pay day, Friday would be the great market day of the week, and Saturday afternoon would become a holiday not only to the working man but to all who have to deal with him in the way of business.
