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BURNS THREATENED TO KILL JACK JOHNSON

Champion's Manager Tells of What Happened Before Sydney Battle.

San Francisco, Feb. 18.—Tommy Burns and Jack Johnson came close to a clash before their fight at Sydney, Australia, last December, according to information received yesterday in a letter written by Sam Fitzpatrick, Johnson's manager, to a local friend.

Fitzpatrick said in part: "Burns, McIntosh, Johnson and myself met at the Challis House, Sydney, three days before the fight for the purpose of picking a referee, and the meeting broke up without any progress being made. Several names were mentioned, but those we named did not suit Burns and vice versa. Without any warning Burns reached Sydney for a large ...

"After McIntosh got the chair away from him, Burns put his hand in his hip pocket and said again that he would kill Johnson. All this time Burns was pouring out a line of abuse on the negro, and not looking good in print. Johnson kept his head, and all he said in reply was, 'Tommy, you're a gentleman.' As Tommy continued in a murderous mood, Johnson's eyes snapped and he said, 'don't hold him, Mac, let us see what he will do.'"

TELLS OF RESOURCES OF THE NORTHLAND

Agnes Deans Cameron Addresses Edmonton Canadian Club.

For the first time in the history of the Canadian Club of Edmonton it had the privilege of being addressed by a lady, Miss Agnes Deans Cameron, the well-known lecturer and northern traveler, says the Edmonton Bulletin.

Few more eloquent addresses have been heard by the members of the club. Miss Cameron spoke for about half an hour and in the course of her remarks presented much that was of peculiar interest to Edmonton people in description of the north and its wonderful possibilities for what is growing. Apart from the material resources of the district to the north of this city, in her closing remarks she reached a higher level and held up to her audience the necessity for the people who have made the west their home, to rightly regard their heritage.

The chair was occupied by Col. Edwards and besides a number of ladies, Premier Rutherford and other prominent men were present. Miss Cameron on rising was greeted with applause. She said in part: "The people of Western Canada are to-day making history. What is history? History is all mankind's story delivered to every man. History is looked backward that every man may look better forward."

"The great west is a page upon which is being written a nation's destiny. The instruments of the west are the plough and the cultivation of the settlers. The history of this country has taught a new lesson in geography. Latitude does not necessarily mean a limitation of settlement and of cultivation in this western land. Nothing does not mean colding in this country. The Saskatchewan river breaks up on an average two weeks earlier than the Allegheny. The horses at Fort Chipewyan live through the entire year round without difficulty."

"On my trip north, at the very tip of the Arctic ocean, I saw wild roses growing, and it has been said that when wild roses will grow wheat will grow. Cultivated flax will mature also. "At Fort Chipewyan the little flour mill was sending wheat to all the posts at the far north. There is certainly a northern limit to the growing but where is it? Years ago Winnipeg was considered the northern limit, later Edmonton, and now we are to Fort Chipewyan and the limit has not yet been reached. I have seen Mr. Ross Sutherland, Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Mr. Oliver had occasion to go up and speak to Mr. Speaker for a moment, and then returned to his seat, in talk with the Premier, who was enjoying the situation. Meanwhile the house was waiting for the motion to adjourn to be put.

"Luxuriousness has led to disintegration and we in Canada must beware of this danger. We are in the trek of the greatest immigration in history. Here we had a manly country, a countryless men. Western Canada presents a new frontier which is being won without bloodshed. In lectures in Chicago and other cities, I have called attention to the fact that the first session of the first legislature of Alberta passed an act to enable it to found a university. This I think is something that is unique in any country in the world. And one of the most hopeful signs of the province is its fine schools in every section of town and country."

Miss Cameron closed with a tribute to the brave men of the past who had opened up Western Canada, and urged upon all Canadians the necessity of realizing the heritage that had been bestowed upon them. The vote of thanks was moved by Premier Rutherford, seconded by J. K. Cornwall, both of whom spoke in high praise of Mrs. Deans Cameron, as endorsed by the members all rising.
