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The more the Deutschman caves are explored the more wonderful they appear to be, and every succeeding report brought down from there of the discovery of new caverns seems to bear out the opinion expressed by W. S. Ayres, M. E., during the visit of the first expedition party to the caves, that the whole mountain is honeycombed, says the Banister Herald.

Two weeks ago the Herald announced the discovery of Mr. Deutschman of another series of caverns at the Big Caves, which he at that time investigated for some little distance. Last week Mr. Deutschman, accompanied by Messrs. Warren Andrews, H. Riley and J. C. McLeod, returned to the caves for further investigation of the new discovery with starting success. Messrs. Andrews, Riley and McLeod returned on Monday from the caves and have given the Herald the following particulars of their investigations into the newly discovered passages:

Entering the cavern, under the guidance of Mr. Deutschman, at 8 o'clock one morning we proceeded for a distance of fully two miles with no evidence of any light, and as our lights were giving out we were compelled to re-turn, reaching the open again at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

The sight in this new cavern was the grandest we have ever seen in our lives, and we never expect to see anything equalling it in magnificence again. The walls and ceiling were literally covered with stalactites, varying in length up to 20 inches. The thousands of feet of crystallized lime hanging like a delicate silk drapery in the air, and as our lights were in places the stalactites and drapery would be of a pure milk color, changing from that to a cream and then again to a pale blue and purple.

DREDGING OF FALSE CREEK PUT FORWARD

Board of Trade Discuss Various Transportation Matters Which Affect the Terminal City.

The transportation commission which is holding sittings in Victoria today heard several applications in Vancouver on Tuesday evening. The board of trade of the Terminal City was represented by A. B. Erskine, R. P. DeLennan, W. G. Duffrey, B. W. Greer, C. M. Beecher, J. D. Turnbull, R. H. Alexander, W. H. Malkin, R. Martin, H. O. Bell-Irving, A. B. Woods, C. M. Woodworth, N. Thompson and Wm. Skene.

On opening the proceedings the chairman of the commission, Robert Reford, of Montreal, stated the object of the meeting. He said the commission had been appointed to ascertain at different points the necessities of transportation, so as to allow the various products of Canada to be shipped to the great markets of the world.
