MONCTON, Sept. 11.—For some time many shippers of freight over the Intercolonial have been reporting that goods packages arrived minus some of their contents, and these losses became so numerous during the last three months as to leave no doubt of their being tampered with in transit. Suspicion pointed to Herbert Leaman, night clerk in the transfer shed at Moncton, and yesterday Detective Skeffington and Constable Keith, armed with a search warrant, visited Leaman's residence, where an astonishing revelation was made.
