ARCHBISHOP SWEATMAN CHOSEN PRIMATE OF ALL CANADA

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 16.—Archbishop Sweatman of Toronto was this afternoon elected archbishop and metropolitan of the ecclesiastical province of Canada and Primate of All Canada, which embraces the British dominions in North America with the exception of Newfoundland. The election to the archbishopric occurred about one o'clock and the bell of St. Alban's cathedral was rung in honor of the event. Shortly thereafter the bishop of Saskatchewan put in an appearance, and the house of bishops, though about prepared to adjourn for luncheon, determined to finish business. Upon Bishop Sweatman was then conferred the double honor. Bishop Thorpe of Algoma, Sault Ste. Marie; Bishop Williams of Huron, London, Ont.; Bishop Carmichael of Montreal; Bishop Holmes of Moose Factory; Bishop Doumoulin of Niagara, Hamilton, Ont.; Bishop Worrell of Nova Scotia (Halifax); Bishop Mills of Ontario (Kingston); Bishop Hamilton of London cathedral, 1875, and later was named Archbishop of Brant. He was appointed, in 1875, assistant minister and acting rector of Woodstock. In 1872 the Bishop of Huron made him his examining chaplain, and, in the same year, he was elected clerical secretary of the diocese, and secretary to the House of Bishops. On the

death of Bishop Bethune, he was elected to succeed him as third Bishop of Toronto, his consecration taking place in Toronto, May 1, 1873. His Lordship received the degree of D.D. from the University of Cambridge University, the same year, and that of D.C. from Trinity University, Toronto, 1882. He was one of the founders of the Church of England Literary and Publishing Company, and was president of the Council of St. Hilda's College, Toronto; president of the Toronto Church School; president of the Bishop Strachan School for girls; president of the Church of England S. S. Association; and a member of the corporation of Trinity University, Toronto. He attended the Lambeth Conference, 1890, and the third Lambeth Conference, 1897. In June, 1887, he laid the cornerstone of the new Cathedral of St. Alban the Martyr, Toronto.

COCKBURN DIDN'T KNOW OF FALSE RETURNS

Evidence Shows He Was Hoodwinked
—Fear for Bank's Credit Prevented Earlier Exposure.

TORONTO, Jan. 16.—In the case against George R. R. Cockburn, accused of signing false bank returns to the government, Crown Attorney Corley today asked for an adjournment of two weeks to allow for further evidence. However, the case was adjourned till Monday, but tomorrow morning argument will be heard before the O. C. Magistrate at his suggestion. Robert B. Caldwell, former inspector of the Ontario Bank, appeared today as a witness, having come from Ottawa on receipt of Mr. Corley's telegram and the service of a subpoena on him at Ottawa. He said: "The matter of the general manager's speculating came up in conversation, and the president and myself decided that the head office should be inspected. The result was that McGill was requested to give me access to the necessary books for inspection. I went to him and McGill said it would be attended to later on. This occurred in 1905 and 1906. I told Mr. Cockburn of my request by McGill, and Cockburn said he would see McGill.
