

B., Jan 16.—The county council has occupied the entire morning with hearing and discussing an application from the trustees of Victoria Hospital, asking for an increase of the grant for the coming year from the council. Carleton Allen and J. H. Barry were heard on behalf of the hospital board. They spoke of the good work being done by the institution, and said that there was a possibility of there being a deficit of some \$600 for the past year. A resolution was introduced to increase the grant, which is now \$500, to \$750 for the next year. An amendment was moved that the grant remain the same. Both the resolution and amendment were under discussion on adjournment at noon.

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 16.—Archbishop Sweatman of Toronto was this afternoon elected archbishop and metropolitan of the ecclesiastical province of Canada and Primate of All Canada, which embraces the British dominions in North America with the exception of Newfoundiand. The election to the archbishopric occurred about one o'clock and the bell of St. Alban's cathedral was rung in honor of the event.
