INDIA'S TAX ON SILVER IS BOMBHELL IN SILVER MARKET

If Market is to be Saved From Demoralization, Sharp Curtailment of Output May be Necessary, Say Some Authorities
—Others Take More Hopeful View

LONDON, March 2.—In the Indian budget of 1909-10 the import duty on silver has been increased from 5 per cent. to 4 annas an ounce and on re-export from 1d. to 1/4d. a gallon. An official of one of the leading banking institutions having extensive dealings with the Far East, referring to the proposed increase of 11 per cent. in the tax on silver imports to India, said: "Presumably this step is taken to raise additional revenue by the government. Not since September, 1907, has the Indian government been a purchaser of silver. All the white metal going to that country has been taken by the merchants, and distributed through the bazaars. The government itself not being in the market for silver supposedly designs to increase its income through imposing an additional revenue tax on the merchants.

PRICES MAY DECLINE FURTHER. The effect of such an increased tax will be to temporarily throw the silver market into some confusion, but within the course of a few months, after readjustment has taken place, I believe India will be quite as large a purchaser as before. The fall of 9-10d. in the price of silver in the London market last week was the direct result of the new move which may be followed by a further decline in the quotations. Some other authorities on silver were inclined to take a less hopeful view of the situation, contending that a 16 per cent. tax would be absolutely prohibitive to the imports of the white metal to India and that consequently a sharp curtailment in output would have to be effected, if the market was to be saved from demoralization. This view, however, did not prevail among the larger dealers and banking institutions.

INDIA A BIG CONSUMER. During the year ended Dec. 31 last, India took about half the total amount of silver imported into Great Britain. The imports of the white metal re-exported at London amounted to £12,000,000, and the exports from there aggregated £12,000,000, of which £5,700,000 went to India. London, practically speaking, is the world's clearing house for silver, and the above statistics therefore indicate the importance of India as a purchaser in the silver market. BOMBHELL IN SILVER MARKET. NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Edward Brush, vice-president of the American Smelting and Refining Company, said in reference to the increased duty proposed by the Indian government on silver: "The India government has thrown a bombshell into the silver market. WHITE PLAGUE REPORT MADE

Commission Recommends Opening of Sanitarium

Dispensaries for Hospital—Knowledge of Tuberculosis Should be Spread

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 2.—This afternoon the Premier presented to the house the report of the commission on tuberculosis. The report is quite a lengthy one and goes fully into the history of tuberculosis, its origin and spread. To a slight extent the disease is hereditary, but for the most part is infectious. There is no doubt in the commission's mind that sanitariums are most essential for the treatment of disease, especially in its incipient stage. A sub-committee was appointed by the commission and this committee visited Montreal, Boston, New York and other places, and set forth the knowledge obtained. The commission after receiving this report and considering the question fully, recommends, among other things, that there should be spread knowledge in regard to the disease to the patient himself and to those he may come in contact with as well as to the general public, that there

should be compulsory notification, that there should be an examination of the situation in each case that is necessary should visit the homes of the sick, that ventilation of all public buildings should be had, that board of health should take greater interest in the disease, that the provincial board of health should be clothed with power and stimulated to take an active interest in the matter and instruct county boards the special person qualified should be appointed to direct the several boards and keep statistics. The commission suggest that special dispensaries for tuberculosis should be formed a part of the branch of all hospitals, that a travelling educational exhibit on tuberculosis should be obtained, accompanied by lectures and should be made a part of all provincial exhibitions and agricultural shows, etc. It is well to acquire a library in order that the people may become more educated and that a chapter of tuberculosis should be inserted in the Health Reader. The commission recommend the establishing of a sanitarium in the province and under this head discuss the situation of the site, the form of building and the superintendent. Regarding the site they say that such building should be near the centre of population, on elevated ground, easy of access, with a good outlook. As to the form of building, the Milaplan cottage hospital is strongly recommended as being the right sample. There should be an administration building in connection. The superintendent should be a man trained and have full knowledge of tuberculosis.

MINERAL PRODUCTION SHOWS BIG INCREASE

It Totals \$90,000,000—Increase of Near \$5,000,000—Yukon Gold Output Shows Gain

OTTAWA, Mar. 2.—The total value of the mineral production of Canada during 1909 was a little over ninety million dollars, an increase of nearly five millions as compared with the preceding year. Nearly all metals show an increased output, according to a preliminary estimate contained in the report issued today by the mines department. The total production of silver during the year is estimated at 27,878,200 ounces, valued at \$14,368,510, of which nearly thirteen million dollars is credited to the Cobalt mines. There was a slight decrease in gold production, which totalled about nine and a half
