Four of their six children and nine of their grandchildren are now members of the same denomination. May 16. 1871, Mr. Cunningham died, after long suffering, in triumphant faith in Christ. Five years later Mrs C. removed to Riverside, Cal., where she has since resided. Dec. 30th last, she suffered a slight shock of paralysis, from which she seemed to recover, however, and by Jan. 24th had become so well that the fears of her children concerning her were completely disarmed, but on the evening of the later date, with but a moment's warning of the change, painlessly and peacefully she fell asleep in Jesus. She was a woman of unusually quiet, pained disposition, always careful of hurting the feelings of others and shrinking instinctively from anything ungentle or unloving. She had one of those finely-drawn natures in which the christian virtues show in their fairest form, and which are the light of the home and the blessing of the church. At the funeral, Jan. 27, in the Riverside Baptist church, a crowded house bore witness to the respect in which she was held; and it was a source of gratification that, although so far from the seenes of her early life, all her children, except one son detained by illness in a neighboring city, were present at the service.
