fight for his lost throne, or his politi-
cal and military career in Portugal, and
exiles and those still in Portugal who
are faithful to him that the flag of
monarchy is still waving in his hands.

Dover, Eng., Oct. 4.—Fifteen officers
and men of the British navy were
drowned today by the sinking of the
submarine "H2" after she had been
cut in two by the Hamburg-American
liner Amerika off the coast of Kent.

Bath, Carlisle Co., Oct. 4.—The
farmers are hauling some of their pro-
