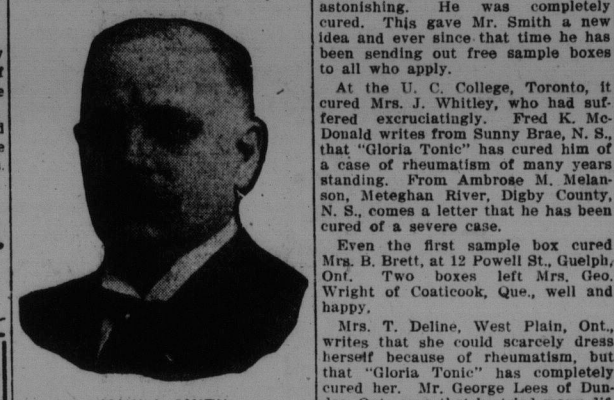

Bath, Carleton Co., Oct. 4.—The far-

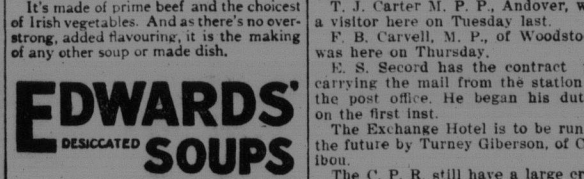
The Exchange Hotel is to be run in

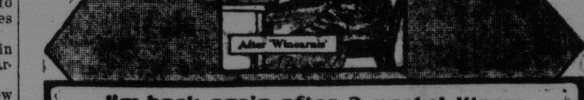
