RED GROSS WILL STOP BELGRADE WORK

can Society to Discontinue Relief in Northern Serbia.

Washington, Nov. 29.—Austria-Hungary has asked the American Red Cross to discontinue relief work in Belgrade and in other parts of Northern Serbla conquered by the Teutonic forces, when supplies now on hand have been distributed. The suggestion reached here today through Ambassador Penfield at Vienna.

The Austrian government expressed its deepest gratitude to the Red Cross for what has been done, and gave no reason for asking its discontinuance. Red Cross officials here, surprised at the request, say the work practic ality is at a standstill because of the impossibility of securing supplies since Roumania entered the war. The work will necessarily cease about December 1.
