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HALIFAX BOATMEN

Business Men and Host of Committees Performed Enormous Amount of Work and Have Succeeded in Restoring City and Dartmouth to Something Like Normal State—Colonel Low Main-Spring in Construction Work and Live Wire.

Halifax, Feb. 1.—When the permanent committee appointed by the Dominion government to handle the question of rebuilding Halifax and Dartmouth took office recently the many voluntary workers who have been labouring on the various relief committees were able to return once more to their private affairs, after having neglected them since December 6, the day the cargo of the Mont Blanc blew up in the harbor. The chief committee, composed of representatives of the various relief committees, met on their work to H. P. Bell, secretary of the executive committee. These reports indicate the immensity of the work the volunteers have been called upon to undertake and are plain, simple tales of the unflinching way the odds were overcome.

Proud of Business Men.
Talking over the work done in Halifax to the writer of this despatch who saw the city as it was immediately after the explosion, Judge Wallace of the Nova Scotia bench, and a member of the Dominion committee, said that the city might well be proud of its younger business men who had served on the committees, as they had stood the test remarkably well. Of the reconstruction committee the judge remarked: "It is my judgment that this organization accomplished marvelous work. The judge's opinion is ratified by F. L. Fowke, Ottawa, Ont., another member of the committee, who told the writer that the reconstruction work had been carried on with "energy and initiative."

Work of Restoration.
The reconstruction committee, of which Col. R. S. Low, builder of Valcartier and Borden military camps, was volunteer manager, and G. Ford Pearson, Halifax, was chairman, was called upon to make repairs to partially ruined buildings, to clear up the ruined area and salvage material that might be useful, plan and construct temporary structures for housing the homeless, and to house in temporary repaired structures, build offices for the commission and its staff, get huge quantities of supplies over a single track line, hire 5,000 in all parts of the Dominion, and at the same time install a business system to handle all the operations.

All Accomplished.
All these tasks have not only been accomplished, but were worked out simultaneously by some wizardry that the report does not describe. It does mention that the lumber bought amounted to 2,600,000 feet (enough to cover a 200 mile long and 14 feet wide strip) and has been used frequently 12 to 15 times. Heading the departments and among the unpaid staff are G. C. Hurdman, member of the Ontario legislature for Ottawa, acting chairman of the committee; George Archibald, Toronto, acting general superintendent; and H. W. Johnson, city engineer, of Halifax.

Engineer Gave Aid.
The city engineer of Halifax rendered very valuable assistance in explaining city bylaws, because notwithstanding the urgency of the work, nothing was done which was not in accordance with the building regulations. Thus every inch of the plumbing and the traces of water and sewer pipes to the wreckage of the city, was passed by an inspector of the city. Much of the reconstruction committee work was done in the temperature below zero.

The reconstruction committee was guided by the future requirements of the government commission in all it did. No shacks were erected on the devastated areas as an error when rebuilding has been completed. The apartments for the refugees were placed on the public property, the commons and exhibition grounds, so that when the commission began to plan reconstruction it would have a clear suitable for use in the militia department's demobilization plans, while the fixtures in them will be available for use by the commission. Where tenants can pay, a rent varying from \$5 to \$12 a month is charged, but where the family is absolutely destitute the relief committee makes the payment. The apartments are laid out in streets and will be named after the municipalities of Canada and the United States which have contributed money so generously towards the relief funds. For instance, Rhode Island and Maine, for their streets and on the first named the Governor McCall apartment is to be named.

Help Cost Little.
A. S. Barnstead, deputy registrar general of Nova Scotia, who is chairman of the mortuary committee, reports that though several hundred workers were included in his staff from December 6 to January 31, only \$25 was paid for clerical help. On this committee were a number of distinguished doctors, while undertakers from all over eastern Canada were employed by it. The report says that 2,100 bodies were buried. 270 being

undiscovered. As bodies are still being found by the searching parties and divers working for the committee, no final figures are as yet available on the total loss of life by the explosion.

The tremendous battle that the transfuge was waged to get the goods of merchants in circulation, and haul much wanted relief material from the railway is moderately depicted in a report by F. A. Gilie, chairman of its organization. Notwithstanding the report states that the military committee handled the influx of wounded on a steamer. The St. John Ambulance report shows that this organization lived up to its name and rendered timely first aid to the injured.

Estimate of Casualties.
The preliminary report of the medical relief committee gives the following estimate of the casualties arising from the disaster: Dead, 1,600; seriously injured, 1,000; slightly injured, 4,000. It tells how the normal hospital equipment of the city, civil and military, were committed to the disposal of the disaster. The Nova Scotia Infectious Hospital in Dartmouth was also shattered, but was soon repaired and supplied with doctors and nurses. The Camp Hill Hospital, which had 280 beds, took in 1,400 patients the first day and a mattress was provided for every case. Wounded were brought to the institution in every kind of conveyance and were even carried in by friends. It was here that the tradition and nurses who arrived first were put. The local doctors, notwithstanding that they were called upon to treat their regular patients, also helped materially with the wounded.

Rush of Relief Supplies.
