Y.M.C.A. Activities For Last Month

Boys, Seniors and Special Classes Show Large Membership and All Interested in the Work.

The Y. M. C. A. has recently issued the following interesting report covering the activities of the Association during the month of January.

Commencing with the Special gymnasium programme on New Year's Day, January proved to be a busy month and well up to the first month of the previous year. Circular letters, adapted to the needs of the different classes and signed by the several class leaders, were mailed to the members early in the New Year, outlining the plans of the season's programme. This helped to keep up interest and also helped to counteract the usual January slump in attendance at classes, due to the skating and other outdoor attractions.

Classes are working on a definite training programme for the Senior Hexathlon and the annual spring circus. Good progress is being made, despite the fact that we are sadly handicapped through lack of music for the class work.

The special class is still being conducted; although the attendance is small, nevertheless the effort is well worth while. Several new boys have been brought into this class, who need special instruction and are benefitting greatly.

The building was thrown open to McAvity's and Thorne's on Tuesday, January third, for their annual social and athletic meet. The programme was conducted entirely by several members of the staff of these two firms. These members were also members of the Senior Leaders' Corps. Mr. Roy Wickett and Mr. Jim Hoyt headed up the different commercial houses in the athletic events.

The Senior Leaders' Corps have kept up their attendance, and are making good progress with the Athletic Dance, which is being prepared for the Exhibition. These boys are being worked up for a special number in the annual Exhibition.

Mr. Maynard McLean conducts the wrestling class; Mr. Wood the boxing class; Mr. Pendleton coaching the Young Ladies' League basketball team. The Harriers' Club is being headed up by two of the Senior Leaders' Corps.

Taking it all over, the Association should feel proud of the large number of volunteer helpers who assist in conducting a heavy programme which it would be impossible to conduct without their help.

The Y. M. C. A. "Senior" basketball team heads the City League in the senior section; the High School team are on top in the Intermediate section in the City League.

League games still continue to draw good houses.

In order to encourage reforestation in Nova Scotia, Mr. Frank J. D. Barnum, of Annapolis Royal, N. S., is offering a cash bonus of \$200 per acre to the farmers of Nova Scotia for every acre of spruce or pine seedlings planted by them on their farms the coming spring of 1922, no one farmer to be paid a bonus on more than 100 acres, so as to distribute the plantings as widely as possible over the Province. Canadian Red Cross Meeting

Plans for Recreation Hut Completed—Favor Red Cross Nursing in Schools—Several Reports Received.

The monthly meeting of the New Brunswick branch of the Canadian Red Cross was held yesterday afternoon at the depot, Prince William street, Rev. Canon Armstrong in the chair. C. B. Allan reported that plans for the recreation hut at Lancaster had been completed and work would be begun as soon as possible. The Junior Red Cross committee presented a resolution to be presented to the Board of Education for red cross teaching in the schools, and this was approved. Miss Melkolehn reported on the work of the district nurses and read the report of the general disease clinics. A message of sympathy was ordered sent to Mrs. Lawrence and Mrs. Taylor on the death of their mother, Mrs. J. V. Ellis.

After the reading of the minutes the report of the secretary was read as follows: "The past month has indeed been a busy one for the Depot, as in addition to the ordinary activities of our office we have the Relief work of the St. John Local Red Cross going steadily on. The work has developed from a few families to almost a hundred who are seeking help of some sort or kind from the Red Cross."

In addition to this local Relief work we have had as our guests for five weeks the Employment Bureau and Registration office. This has so far been supported by the Rotary Club with the addition of the Salvation Army, and the very material assistance given by the Red Cross of heat, rent and light.

Through the Provincial Depoche last month many parcels have passed to and fro. To the new Soldiers' Memorial Hospital at Campbellton, bandages, dressings, hospital shirts, towels and operating gowns for the nurses have been sent; to Newcastle a box of ready cut garments for the relief in that town; to be made up by the ladies of the Red Cross; to the Willing Workers of Gormain street Baptist church a large parcel of sewing was sent to be made up for the Local Relief; and to the following branches were sent parcels of sewing: Lakesville, Grand Manan, Hopeville Hill, and Welsford. The incoming parcels have been from Rothesay Red Cross, Grand Manan, St. John, Quoddytown, Silver Falls, Kilburn, Clifton, Macarache, Plaisir and Welsford. The W. A. of the latter place sent a parcel of 38 sick parcels. The case of a sick soldier in Dorchester has been cared for and a nurse has gone over from Sackville. Dr. MacArthur has made a personal visit to the case and is doing all he can.

An appeal was received in connection with a soldier's wife in the province who was being badly treated by her husband, and who wished to be deported. This affair was brought to the proper channels who took the necessary steps to have her removed. Before closing I would like to voice our appreciation of the faithful volunteer helpers on whom we so frequently call. Without their aid it would be quite impossible to carry on a large undertaking with so small a staff. To Mr. Kerr our thanks are also due for his very great help on several occasions by having our multigraphing done in his office at his own expense.

The treasurer reported receipts for the month, including the balance on hand of \$30,664.44, \$23,272.84, and a disbursement of \$2,267.53 leaving a balance on hand of \$51,669.75.

A communication from the Red Cross of Bangor in reference to the hospital expenses of a Canadian soldier who was taken sick in Bangor, was referred to the head office of the Red Cross of Canada.

On motion it was decided to pay the local expenses of Miss Smith while in Fredericton in consultation with Miss Melkolehn.

A vote of thanks was received from Miss Elsie Clement for a copy of the Bulletin, and communications were read from the Grand Manan branch, Miss Ferris, nurse at Campbellton, and a letter of thanks for the use of a hospital bed.

Mr. C. B. Allan reported for the hospital committee that the usual visits had been made during the month and that three patients had died, one at East St. John and two at Lancaster.

Miss Allison, for the sewing committee, reported 60 garments sent out and 129 garments and 45 pairs of socks and mitts sent in during the month.

C. B. Allan reported for the recreation hut committee that Mr. Brodie had completed the detailed plans of the building and a start would be made as soon as possible.

The Junior Red Cross report was submitted by Miss Jessie Lawton. The committee had met and sent out a questionnaire to every member of the executive of the society, and in every case the reply had been favorable to having the Junior work taken up in the schools, and she presented the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by the meeting:

"Whereas it is the nation's duty to teach habits of health, citizenship, and service to the rising generation; and

"Whereas, the Junior Red Cross is one of the best known methods of accomplishing this, and

"Whereas, there seems to be no reason why this great movement should not be as successful in New Brunswick as it has been in other parts of the Dominion;

"Therefore the New Brunswick division of the Canadian Red Cross Society, through its executive, representing every county in the Province, does hereby petition the Board of Education of New Brunswick for permission for the teaching of any school in the Province, who wishes to do so, to carry on Junior Red Cross work, the

last half hour on Friday afternoon, it being distinctly understood that the programme for such Junior Red Cross work will be subject to the approval of the Departments of Health and Education."

Mrs. P. S. White reported for the relief committee of the local branch that there were about ninety families on the list at present, with an average of 70 being cared for each week.

Miss Melkolehn reported for the district nurses. At Chatham there had been 313 visits made by the nurses; at Campbellton 228 visits; no report was in from Buctouche, as the nurse was away for about ten days on account of the illness of her mother; at Riley Brook there had been 80 visits made to 38 sick persons. Beautiful

the nurse had been given a horse and all the necessary fittings for a team, and had covered over 100 miles of territory; at St. Stephen there had been 284 calls made, and at Miramichi, where Miss M. E. Smith was sent on Jan. 27, she was getting down to business, having been provided with a two-room house, which she was going to use as a clinic and health centre. The total number of visits for the month in the province was 1,027. She also reported a request for the services of Miss Maloney at Acadiaville, and the granting of this request was recommended by Miss Melkolehn thought it wise.

Miss Melkolehn read the report of Dr. McCarthy on venereal disease. During the month of January there had been reported 82 cases, and the total under treatment to date in the province was 232. He recommended that the St. John clinic a whole-time nurse to act as social service worker and look after women patients in the outdoor department, and a whole-time orderly who would do the same for the men.

It was decided to take up the matter of appointing a disaster and relief committee at the next meeting. A message of sympathy on the death of their mother, Mrs. J. V. Ellis, was ordered sent to Mrs. E. R. Taylor and Mrs. Lawrence.
