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If infidelity triumph and Christianity be overthrown, it means the demoralization of society. The one idea in the Bible is the idea of retribution. The Vibration of Sound.

According to Lord Rayleigh, certain experiments have shown vibration of sound having an amplitude of less than one-twelfth millionth of a centimetre could still affect the sense of hearing. Supposing it susceptible of being so small, such a vibration would be so short that it would have to be enlarged 100 times before a powerful microscope could render it visible.
