Here, it is believed, will be fought the first battle on Gen. Baller's line of cam-paige. Reference to the map and the latest despatches will show that the British have blocked the Boer advance along this line, and a few days are ex-pected to being news of the start of the movement to hull the invaders back. The Boers are in force north of Hope-town and Orange River, but the British force at the latter place prevents a fur-ther advance in that direction. The Boers are also in Colesberg, but the British block the way south at Nasawpoort. 
