ALLOTMENT OF CHURCH PEWS. Interesting Case in Ontario-No Rent, Can

Be No Allotment.

Toronto, Jan. 2—(Special)—The trustees of the Methodist church at Carleton Place, and C. W. Young, a member, sued George Keys; another member, for trespass in using a pew which had been allotted to Young. Keys denied the right of the trustees to allot a pew, as no rental was charged. The county judge of Lanark found for the plaintiff, and gave nominal damages of \$1. The case was carried to the divisional court here, and today judgment was rendered, reversing the county judge's decision.
