Exciting scenes in the French Assembly—Thiers on trial.

The scenes were extremely exciting in the National Assembly Chamber, pending the discussion which resulted in the deposition of Thiers and the election of MacMahon. In the President's box were Madame Thiers, the Prefect of the Department of the Seine, and others, who were gesticulating wildly, and once the Prefect was called to order for the ardor of his enthusiasm.

The diplomatic corps was well represented. Lord Lyons, the British Minister, was not present, being engaged in giving dinner and reception in honor of Queen Victoria's birthday. Many celebrated women of Napoleon's court, as well as of the Republic, occupied conspicuous places and remained until the political change was consummated. As soon as the vote was taken, depositing Thiers, the representatives of the different countries immediately left the chamber and telegraphed the news to their respective governments.

Thiers sat a close watcher of the events, and constantly making the change in his countenance, as if he had been a man who counts the cost of every drop of blood. He is said to have fallen—I rather wish to say he has fallen.
