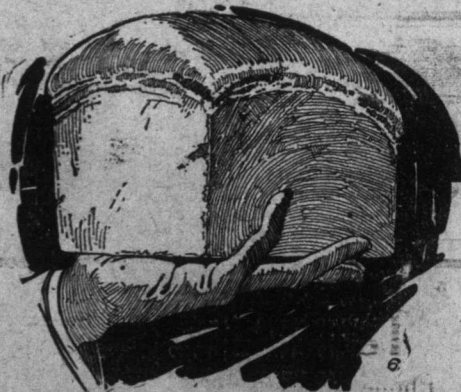

The death occurred in Galt of Mar-

**Building in Guelph This Year.**  
Permits, issued in Guelph up to  
date this year, show a big increase  
over 1918, up to the same time. Sep-  
tember was another big month, and  
in the permits taken out were those  
for several factory extensions. The  
total for September, this year, amount-  
ed to \$60,785, while for the same  
month in 1918, the amount was only  
\$6,991. The 1919 permits, up to the  
end of September, reach the very  
satisfactory figure of \$431,217. For  
the first seven months of 1918, the  
total was only \$76,064. The dwellings  
that are being erected by the Guelph  
Housing Commission, and under con-  
struction at the present time, are  
valued at \$32,300. The permits for  
the month just closed are:
