GRT STEPS AHEAD WITH THEIR OWN CARTRIDGES

GRT has taken another step in increasing their Canadian content; this program now applies to manufacturing as well as music. The Canadian content handled by GRT is at a rapidly increasing pace, and with Canadian groups such as "Illustration" there is likely to be a lot more before long. GRT has now made a 8 track cartridge that virtually eliminates the quality problems that plague other 8 track cartridges. While this module was primarily designed for GRT's own use, they have decided to make it available to other duplicators. What does this mean to the public? Well, it means now we have the most reliable 8 track cartridge available and it is Canadian made.

JOHN SIMON — "JOHN SIMON'S ALBUM" (WB - 1849)

Let me give you a bit of background about John Simon. He is the brother of Paul Simon (Simon & Garfunkel), he is a producer having to his credit, "Music From Big Pink," "The Band," "Cheap Thrills," "Child Is Father To The Man" (1st LP by BS & T). These are but a few of his accomplishments. He now has a very good album to add to the above list. The tunes vary from the beautiful "Rain Song," to the haunting "The Fool Dressed In Velvet" to the "Band" like "Davey's on the Road Agin" co-written with Robbie Robertson.

The personnel reads like a super jam session, with people like Leon Russell, Garth Hudson, Rick Danko, Richard Manuel, Grady Tate, Harvey Brooks and a load of others. Simon plays the piano, mandola and horns. His singing puts across the thoughts in a very effective way and the whole album doesn't have a false note in it. Especially good is "Tannenbaum" and "Motorcycle Man." Simon's album will not appeal to everybody, because it is not a commercial album but if you dig rock with a touch of brilliance that doesn't blow the ears apart, then this is for you. It is one of the most enjoyable albums I have heard this year.

"ERIC BURDON DECLARES WAR" (MGM-SE 4662)

When the original Animals broke up, Eric Burdon managed to put together various bands with reasonable sounds to keep the name "The Animals". Since the last group of imposter's fell apart, Burdon has been working with a new band "WAR" and this is the result of those efforts. This album is really an effort to listen to. The tunes are all very similar and without a scorecard you can't tell what is what. Their pretentiousness outweighs any artistic merit the album might have had.

The album includes their present single "Spill The Wine" and it's just as bad in stereo as it is on the radio. Their version of "Tobacco Road" is so long and drawn out that it loses its effectiveness. The best part of the album is the opening chords on the piano by Lonnie Jordan, in "Dedication", as soon as Burdon opens his mouth the rest of the album and that song becomes one long hummer.

MELBA MOORE "LIVING TO GIVE" (Mercury SR 61255)

This talented lady from "Hair" and now knocking them dead each night as the lead in "Purlie" has one of the best voices that has come along in a long time. The tunes are well chosen and each one sung as if it were tailor made for her. The tunes I have heard before are given new treatment and revised in a very effective tasteful way. Particularly good are, Captain St. Lucifer and Purlie, the song from her show. A very impressive album for a first try. I think there will be many more.

Throw papers away: McKechnie

MISSISSAUGA — When a bundle of daily newspapers is dropped off in your ditch you should pick them up and throw them in the garbage, town councillor Frank McKechnie proposed last week. The suggestion was made at Mississauga general committee after McKechnie received a letter from R. H. Poole, of Klude Drive in Malton, complaining of wrapped bundles of daily newspapers strewn around the curbs. Calls to the three dailies brought no action, the letter said. Poole explained that young newspaper delivery boys left their bundle wrappers and extra papers lying all over the road. He proposed that legislation be passed requiring newspaper delivery trucks to drop their bundles at the delivery boy's doorstep. The letter further complained of unnecessary newspaper honor boxes cluttering the landscape. Youths "with little else to do" vandalized the boxes and throw the papers all over the road in his area of Malton, Poole said. McKechnie brought a stack of half a dozen Toronto papers still in their plastic wrappers to general committee. He explained he found them just lying beside the road in Malton. "I don't think taking them and throwing them away is stealing because the papers are just lying in the street," McKechnie said. He reasoned if a few people did this the newspapers would soon alter their delivery system. A motion by Mayor Bob Speck to write the three Toronto dailies and ask for their co-operation in clearing up the problem was approved by the committee.

Remedial riding at 3C Ranch

STREETSVILLE—Physically handicapped youngsters are now taking remedial riding lessons weekly at J. Cusack's Three C Ranch, Burnhamthorpe Road and Fifth Line. A group of them were out in force to watch the Dominion Day Horse and Pony Show held at the ranch and are now studying hard to become accomplished riders in their own right. Members of this special class include Brad Armstrong, Streetsville; Robert McIntosh, Applewood Heights; Lynne McCloskey, Cooksville and Al Guelin of Meadowdale. Also a guest at the ranch is 12-year-old Robert Starkey from Bedelsford Special School, Kingston-on-Thames, England. This lad plans to ride Bill McCann's palomino Dusty in a special sponsored ride from Huron Park to the Canadian National Exhibition Horse Show on Sunday, August 23. His special ride with financial aid is the cause of riding in Mississauga.
