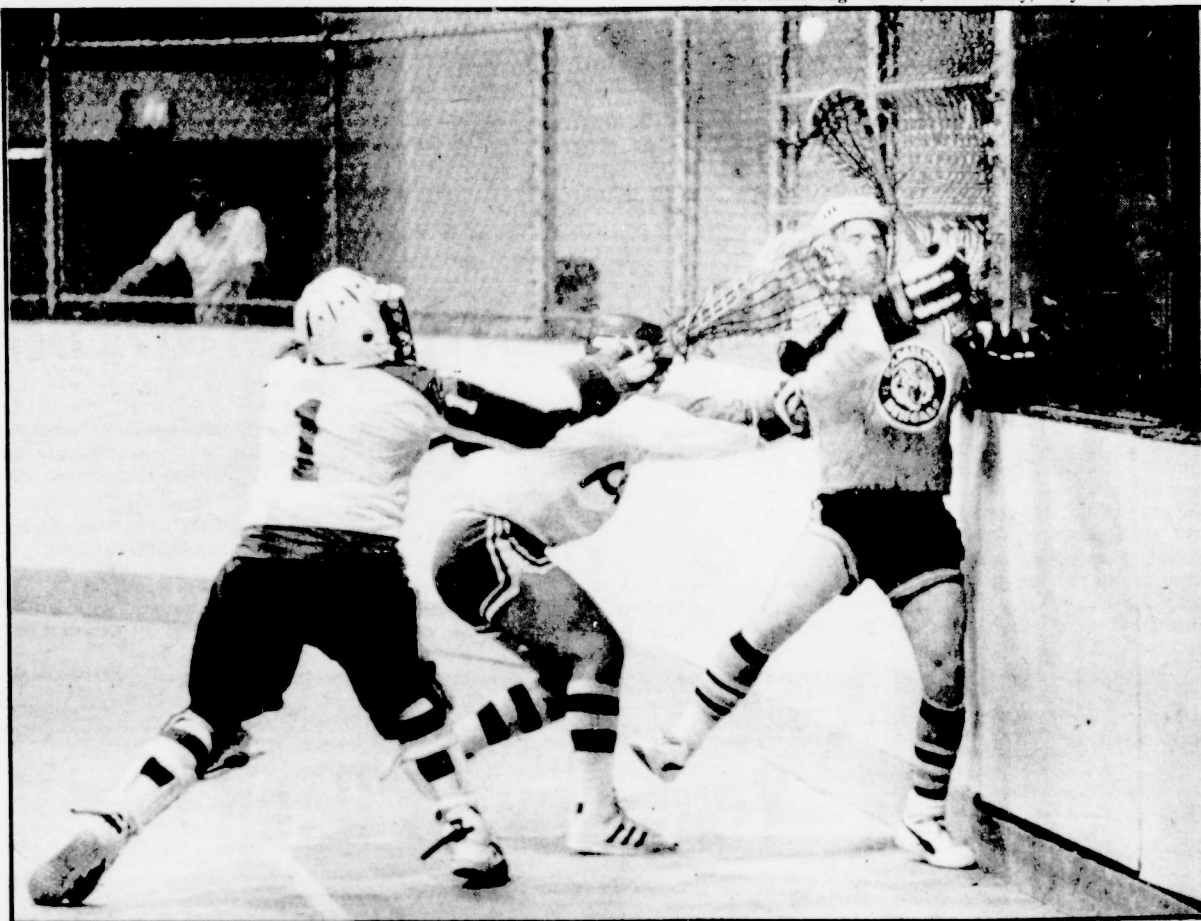
Track and Field

PCOs ready for big showdown

An aggressive defence, some timely scoring and a couple of broken ribs combined to help Mississauga PCOs defeat Hamilton Bengals Sunday night at Huron Park Arena.

The 16-10 victory evened the best of seven OLA junior A lacrosse quarter-final series at two games apiece and set the stage for a pivotal fifth game at Hamilton Mountain Arena Tuesday (last) night.

The Sunday game was a continuation of the hard-hitting style of play that carried the PCOs to a 20-17 victory in the third

game of the series, last Friday at Huron Park. They lost the first game 18-8 and the second 19-9.

Mississauga coach Jerry Jarman, the first to admit that his team has played poor defensive lacrosse this year, was understandably happy with their play Sunday.

"When we can hit the man and take him out of the play like we did tonight, then we're going to be a successful team," he said.

One player the PCOs didn't have to hit again was Bengal scoring ace Phil Scarfone. He broke two ribs in the Hamilton home victory last Thursday and will be lost for

the rest of the season. His loss is critical to the Bengal chances of surviving the series.

"There's no doubt he's the leader of this team," said Bengal coach Phil Morgan. "But it's really my fault about the way we played tonight. I've set up a system of play that's totally dependent on Scarfone and our big offensive shooters.

"With his loss and Bob McGinn not playing because of work commitments we're trying to fill with fringe players. As you saw tonight, they just can't seem to plug into our system."

It's debatable whether Scarfone could have

made a difference to Hamilton on Sunday.

The PCOs dominated from the opening whistle. They hit the Bengals at every opportunity and worked the fast break repeatedly. Only good goaltending kept the score close.

PCOs dominated the third period but still led only 13-10 with seven minutes remaining.

A foolish tripping penalty to the PCOs, the type of penalty that cost them the first two games in Hamilton, gave the Bengals a chance.

But with Scarfone gone, the deadly Bengal power-play was derailed. Not only didn't

Hamilton score, but PCOs Owen Ivey and Brian Hall scored shorthanded goals to seal the victory.

Brian Hall, the best man on the floor, led PCOs with four goals and three assists. Chris Jarman also had four while Steve Maddick and John Lafontaine scored twice each. Singles came from Owen Ivey, Daryl Clancy, Craig Laughton and Steve Dodds.

Sixth game of the series is Wednesday (tonight) at Huron Park at 8 p.m. If a seventh game is necessary, it will be this Thursday at 8:30 p.m. in Hamilton.

Norma beats handicap on greens

There are times when golf can be frustrating for even the pros by Mississauga's Norma Lee heads into this week's Ontario Senior Ladies' Tournament in St. Catharines with one of the biggest handicaps in the game.

She suffers from Multiple Sclerosis — a crippling disease which has cost her the use of both legs. She plays golf on two canes. But that hasn't stopped her from golfing three times a week.

"I walk up to the ball, get my balance and drop one of my canes," the Brampton Golf Club member says. "I use a shoulder turn motion when I hit it."

A golfer for 20 years, she discovered she had MS eight years ago after playing in the Canadian Ladies' tournament with the Ontario team in Saskatoon.

The tournament had ended the day before and that was to be her final golf game for over a year. Encouraged by her husband

Calvin, Lee got back on the links the next year and found out that if she was to continue golfing she'd have to change her game in a big way.

"It was pretty frustrating when I fell on my face a few times," she says. "I tried to play my old style."

She has worked on her game since and has even continued cross-country skiing.

"I used to find it (golf) difficult," she says. "Now it's much easier. You lose a lot of power in your game so you have to build up the muscles in the upper part of your body."

But power isn't the only thing that suffers in her game. When she is on a hill or playing in windy conditions, she tends to lose her balance.

The disadvantages haven't stopped her from winning the Hamilton District Tournament and being runner-up in the Mississauga District Tournament four times.

But playing in the Ontario tournament is a different story. "I would say my chances are slim to none," she says. "I go mainly as a team player."

Lee has talked to people with MS and tries to encourage them to pick up where they left off before their attacks.

"A lot of them (people with MS) come up and talk to me at the tournaments," she says. "It's a good thing for them to know they can continue."

"You have to play within yourself. The next day you're tired and exhausted."

She is looking forward to playing in the tournament at St. Catharines after playing all last week at the Westmount Golf Club in Kitchener.

Other Mississauga golfers in the tournament include Yolande Whitelaw, Joan Wright, Lil Stubbs and Margaret Munro.
