400,000 TONS AND MORE

Is the Record of Rossland Camp For 1933 to Date.

Busy Week at Mines Despite Interruption of Holidays.

The Rossland camp has shipped or crushed over 400,000 tons of ore during the present year, with four days to run, in which the total will be brought up to a figure that will allow of liberal discounts and still permit the total specified to be used.

AN INTERESTING FEATURE OF THE PAST week in the local mining industry was the announcement that the Le Roi mine had been shipping ore from its 1350 foot level for more than a month, and that the showing in that section of the mine remained strong.

WAR EAGLE—Christmas day was the only break in the week's work at the mine. Development and stopping were maintained on conventional lines.

WHITE BEAR—The mine worked steadily throughout the week, activity being maintained on the 1000 level.
