

CITY AND COUNTRY

From Thursday's Morning Leader

Dr. M. M. Seymour, provincial health officer, left yesterday morning on an inspection trip up the north line and along the main line of the C.N.R. for the purpose of investigating serious outbreaks of diphtheria and scarlet fever.

The keeper of the city herd appeared yesterday before the magistrate charged with having unlawfully taken certain cattle out of pounds. Some ten or a dozen of the animals under the herder's charge, according to the evidence given, had wandered onto Kelly McArthur's farm and done more or less damage and had been put in pound by Mr. Kelly, more with the idea of impressing the herder with his responsibility than of exacting any penalty. The herder, however, so far from appreciating the lesson, took it upon himself to liberate the offending cows with the result that he was fined \$1 and warned not to do it again.

From Friday's Morning Leader

Two Germans were surprised by Corporal Hogg while shooting on the banks of the reservoir, at ducks, and fined \$10, with costs, by Magistrate Redgrave.

Indian Head Philharmonic society will present Gilbert & Sullivan's comic opera, "H. M. S. Pinafore" at the city hall on Sept. 10. The license fee for stage plays has been revoked in the case of this club.

At the Victoria Hospital meeting last evening, a resolution was carried, authorising the chairman and secretary-treasurer to transfer the real and personal property of the hospital to the city.

Corp. Hogg received quite an ovation last night as he walked up to receive the prizes won by him in the rifle competitions. His committal for trial has by no means diminished his popularity, rather indeed the reverse.

Arthur Davis appeared before Magistrate Trant yesterday morning charged with having appropriated a pair of trousers and a pair of shoes from the east end store of the McCarthy Supply Co. The anxiety of Davis to tog himself out at the expense of the McCarthy Co. resulted in his being sent to three months hard labor.

Reporting on the results of their tour through the wheat lands of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, the grain dealers who took part in the trip state that the crop will be better than they expected. Barley was a very poor crop, generally speaking, but they had seen some nice fields of flax between Regina and Aroclan. There were occasional signs of frost among the oats between Regina and Saskatoon, but the crop is said to be very green, and not an exceptionally heavy stand.

A report was current in the city yesterday to the effect that a man connected with the real estate in the city during the last year or so had eloped with the wife of a north side resident. The lady in question, it is said, left home one day this week for the ostensible purpose of spending a night in the country. Instead of returning home the next day, it is alleged that she departed with the latest object of her affections.

From Saturday's Morning Leader

It has been suggested to the city that owing to the prevalence of glanders among horses at the present time it would be well as a precautionary measure to close the public watering trough on Oster market, as such watering places are often active agencies in spreading the disease. It is likely, in consequence that the trough will be closed.

Svensen, the workman who was badly crushed on Wednesday last by a fall of earth at the new computing basin three miles outside of the city limits, died from his injuries on Thursday afternoon. The man was brought into town after the accident and every care and attention given to him at the hospital, but without avail.

The management of the King's Hotel have now placed a public stenographer in the rotunda for the convenience of their many patrons who desire to have letters or other business documents typewritten with dispatch. The Kings is the only hotel between Winnipeg and the coast provided with this convenience, which is likely to be greatly appreciated, especially by the commercial men who patronise the house.

From Monday's Morning Leader

The high school opens tomorrow for the first time under the new act. At the opening services in the new Methodist church on Sept. 22, the preacher will be Rev. Dr. Sparling of Winnipeg.

Kempson McKim, president of the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council, organized the first union in Regina—Typographical Union No. 657.

The last of the regular Sunday services at the old Methodist Church, Hamilton street took place yesterday. They were conducted by the pastor, the Rev. C. W. Brown, who spoke of the supersession of the older building in favor of the newer and more commodious one, of the associations connected with the church, and of the needs of Methodism in the present day. There were the usual large congregations. At the morning service Mrs. Fraser, of Toronto, sang "Oh Saviour, Guide Us," and the evening solo, "Behold the Master Passes By," was rendered by Mr. C. H. Parker, of Minneapolis. Services will be held on the two Sundays following in the spacious lecture hall of the new church, and on September 22nd the building will be dedicated to Divine Worship.

Boys fooling with a small calibre 22 run last evening resulted in the young son of Mr. Brunner, of German town, undergoing a somewhat unpleasant experience. The boys were playing with the gun in the neighborhood of Oster street market, when it was fired off, striking young Brunner in the fleshy part of the leg above the knee, inflicting a rather painful but not serious wound. The injured boy was seen by Dr. Thomson, and the wound dressed. The boy who fired the shot is said to be a German living north of the city near the old legislative building. While it is not believed that the shot was fired intentionally, steps will be

taken by the police today to ascertain the name of the erratic young gunner with a view to impressing upon him the wisdom of not firing guns in a haphazard manner within the city limits.

Having been for eight years the organist at Cobourg, Ont., Metropolitan Church, J. Edward Fisher came to this city about three weeks ago, and joined the Regina Conservatory of Music as teacher of piano, organ and theory, and the Methodist church as its organist and choir master. Originally Mr. Fisher resided at London, England, and prosecuted his musical studies in that city and at Havre, France. A musician of distinction, Mr. Fisher will doubtless assert his ability in a position which will give him large scope for his exercise. With regard to his departure from Cobourg, "The World," a newspaper published in that town, stated: "During his stay in Cobourg Mr. Fisher has proved himself to be a musician of splendid ability and of a rich excellence, who has done much to raise the standard of music in the church and amongst his pupils and the town generally. His departure is much regretted."

From Tuesday's Morning Leader

Despite the fact that yesterday was a holiday and the city crowded, the police at a late hour last night were able to report a clean sheet.

Good progress is being made by the contractors on the new school building at MacLean. When completed the new school house will present a splendid appearance and will be a credit to the village.

The new Roman Catholic church at Qu'Appelle is almost completed. The building reflects great credit on the contractors, Wilson & Co., of Qu'Appelle, and Messrs. Storey & Van Edmond, architects, of this city.

The mounted police met last evening in the city a half intoxicated foreigner from Germantown who complained of having been assaulted by Hungarians, and bore evident marks of battery. They have at present no clue to his supposed assailants.

A sketch of the foundation and progress of trades unionism in Regina and Moose Jaw, with photographs of the principal officers, appears in yesterday's Morning Leader. A few copies of which are still available.

A pastoral scene on Golden West Stock farm, Regina, is the title of a photograph of some of Mr. P. M. Brad's horses and cows, which appeared in the last number of "The Farmer." The pictures are picturesque and the five stock show effectively.

The bombardment of the ducks began before sunrise yesterday morning, hunters being away in the neighborhood of the Reservoir and Wascana creek in a manner suggestive of a miniature battle. Other sportsmen went further afield north and to the McLean and the adjacent district. Some large bags are reported.

A dray loaded with wood paring blocks got badly stuck yesterday afternoon in the C. P. R. freight yards. The wheels of the dray sank nearly up to the axle and every effort on the part of the bumpy team hitched to the dray proved unavailing. The extent to which the horses exerted themselves to extract the vehicle from the morass may be judged from the fact that the white tree was broken during the struggle.

Duffield, the individual who left the city last week with another man's wife, was brought back to town on Sunday by the R.N.W.M.P., having been rudely interrupted at Portal while in the enjoyment of a champagne repast with the other man's wife. He was brought back on the charge of having stolen a revolver belonging to the wronged husband and will appear before the magistrate this afternoon in answer to the charge. The lady in the case is said to have returned to the city with the latest man of her choice, but with no apparent intention of going back to her husband.

It is the intention of Ald. Thor, Wilkinson at an early date to introduce in the City Council a bylaw providing for the installation of a free library in the new City Hall. Speaking to the Leader on the subject, Mr. Wilkinson stated that the time had certainly arrived when such an institution should be founded in the city and that he believed that a sum of \$10,000 or \$15,000 would start the library in a manner worthy of the city. Three or four spacious rooms can be set aside for the library in the top storey of the new City Hall, providing accommodation for a reading and writing room, reference library and lending library.

The interior work of the new City Hall is proceeding apace, the first coat of plaster having already been completed throughout the building and the greater part of the final coat having been put on in the auditorium. Several slight alterations have been made by the City Hall Committee in the layout of the building with a view to utilising the space to the best possible advantage and adding to the convenience and comfort of several of the city offices. In the basement of the hall a large room is to be utilised as a sports committee room, to be placed at the disposal of the various athletic organizations of the city, while another room will be used as an armory. Room will also be found in the basement for the bankers' clearing house.

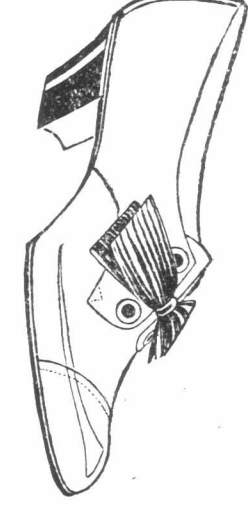
