KILLED THEMSELVES.

A Couple of Sunday Tragedies in Toronto.

O. F. Botsford, a Queen Street Chemist, found at the foot of Leslie Street, with a bullet wound in the head. The body was in Watchman Hill's boat, moored near the Paint Factory.

Toronto, May 11.

The body of O. F. Botsford, druggist, 1064 Queen-street west, is lying in the morgue with a bullet wound in the head, the effects of a revolver fired by himself.

On Friday night the deceased attended a social gathering in the west end, and acted so strangely as to draw considerable attention to himself. Since then little was seen of him until yesterday morning, when he was found in the watchman at the Canada Paint Works, foot of Leslie-street, saw him wandering around. About 3.30 in the afternoon, when Hill went down to use his boat, which he keeps moored near the factory, he found the body of a man lying in the bottom of the boat, with the head resting on the seat, and a revolver grasped in the right hand. The ball had entered the head just above the right ear and came out at the left side.

The deceased was added to the use of cocaine, and for some time kept a loaded revolver in the store, much to the discomfort of his clerk and customers.

Botsford was a nephew of C. S. Botsford, the dry goods man, and a brother of N. W. Botsford, a traveler. Besides these he leaves two sisters, a wife and a child.

Coroner Greig will hold an inquest Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

A CONDUCTOR'S DEATH

From Too Big a Dose of Morphine Administered by Himself.

Toronto, May 11.

John W. Sedgwick, a conductor on the Toronto and North York Railway Company, and residing at 2 Spadina-avenue, died in the General Hospital shortly before noon yesterday as a result of an overdose of morphine administered by himself.

Sedgwick was 25 years of age and had not been enjoying good health lately. He was a typhoid patient in the General Hospital for nearly three months at the latter part of last year and has not since been thoroughly recovered.

He was taken to the hospital on Friday night and on his return at 11.30 completed his duties as usual. He went to bed and when his mother awoke in the morning she found him unconscious.

Dr. J. C. Hay and Dr. R. McPail were immediately summoned and found that Sedgwick showed symptoms of morphine poisoning. After working upon him for some time the medical men decided that the deceased should be removed to the General Hospital.

Behind the bed in which Sedgwick lay, an empty drugist's envelope was found containing a quantity of morphine and a grain of which was in each powder-pan. It was found that Sedgwick had taken all of the powder in his possession.

R. F. Sedgwick, a brother, who is also a conductor on the T. & N. R., accompanied him in the police van to the hospital, but notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of the hospital staff he died before the ambulance arrived.

STABBED TO THE HEART.

Jacob Hill, a Brand Indian, Near Cathcart, Recently Killed.

Brantford, May 10.—Jacob Hill, an Indian living in the neighborhood of Cathcart, while quarrelling with his neighbor, James Clark, yesterday drew a butcher knife and stabbed him to the heart. Hill is now in jail in this place.

Fowler, Ind., May 10.—Fries Heinrich, a farmer, had last night a family of six boys, and when three children, six of them being less than a day old.

About midnight he was sent after the doctor in a hurry, and as he went he reflected upon the fact that he had been with two bouncing girls and a boy.

The doctor drove heavily and the children were born in a matter of minutes. The mother is well and the babies are bright and well developed and able to cry lustily.

She came here when 8 years old, with the age of 103 years. Mr. and Mrs. Heinrich were married in Pennsylvania in 1857 and have been living in this State since 1853.

Railways Will Charge Bicycles Exaggeratedly.

An agreement has been entered into between the different Canadian roads, to charge for the carriage of bicycles at the rate of 10c per pound, and it is announced that each bicycle or tricycle will be charged for the same at fifty pounds of excess baggage.
