PRIMITIVE ANCHORS.

Stones and Wooden Tubes Filled With Lead First Used.

There appear to be two ideas which have led up to the invention of the modern anchor—first, that of attaching the vessel by means of a rope or chain to a weight sufficiently heavy to keep the vessel from moving when the weight has sunk to the bottom of the sea, and, second, that of using a hook instead of or in addition to the weight, so as to catch in the bottom. The English word anchor is practically the same as the Latin ancora and the Greek angiura, meaning "that the Greek angkura, meaning "that which has an angle," from the root

ank, bent.
The earliest anchors made on the hook principle probably only had one fluke instead of two. In the "Sussex Archaell, Coll." there is an illustration of what has been surmised to be an anchor made out of the natural forked branch of a tree. It was found with an ancient British canoe at Burpham, an ancient British cance at Burpham, Sussex. There is in the British museum an interesting leaden anchor with two flukes bearing a Greek inscription. Its date is about 50 B. C., and it was found off the coast of Cyrene,

The invention of the anchor with two flukes is attributed by Pausanius to Miles by Plus to Fundames and

to Midas, by Pliny to Eupalamas and by Strabo to Anacharsis. Diodorus Siculus states that the first anchers were wooden tubes filled with lead, while another classical writer says that before the introduction of metal anchors lumps of stone with a hole through the middle for the attach-



LAKE STEAMER BURNED

Man and Woman Perish in Disastrous Fire on Board.

'Picton' Completely Gutted-Loss of Vessel and Cargo Very Heavy-Sudden Outbreak Results In Death of Passenger and One of the Crew -The Fire Spread With Fearful

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Fire broke out on board the steamer Picton while lying at her wharf on Saturday afternoon, in which two persons lost their lives and many others had narrow escapes. The victims were a young woman named Winnie Hatch, fiancee of the ship's cook, and a deckhand, George Kleskie.

Fire Spread Rapidly. No one knows what caused the fire, but all remark on its rapid spread. A quantity of paint and oil was in the

"It looked just like a lantern in the engine-room at first," said George Kemp, one of the crew, "but before you could say Jack Robinson the whole place was in flames. I started for the stairways, but some one said that all on the upper deck had gotten off. A little girl came running along and I told her to get on the wharf. I tried then to get to my bunk, but couldn't get near it."

Another said that he left the bost att and ran along the dock to the forward gangplank, but the smoke was so bad he couldn't get on board.

The Picton carried four lifeboats, each with a capacity of fifteen. There was also a good supply of fire hose on board, but when it was run out for use the machinery could not be reached to set the pumps going.

The firemen were on the spot and at work in very quick time, but they were badly hampered as they could only reach the blaze to advantage from the one side, Ladders were run to the upper decks and hose carried on board and into the heart of the blaze. In 30 minutes the fire was well under control.

The fireboat was also soon to arrive, and threw two light but effective streams from astern. Employes of the Toronto Electric Light Co., under George Beare, were the first to throw water on the burning vessel from the small 11-2-inch hose used in the boiler-rooms, the pumps being run up to 130 pounds pressure. Only for their prompt measures, the fire would likely have spread into the boiler-rooms. The window frames are badly charred, and so is the packing around some of the machinery. The smoke filled the rooms and the men had a hard task.

The fire completely gutted the steamer, which, yesterday, resting on the bottom and tilted to one side, presented an appearance of almost complete ruin. Although the forward exterior shows no sign of fire, the interior is gone. The fire was evidently fiercest around the engine and boiler rooms.

GRAND STAND WRECKED.

Four Fatally Hurt and Hundreds Injured at Baseball Game.

Pottsville, Pa., Sept. 23.—A windstorm of cyclonic force, accompanied by sharp lightning, visited part of Schulykill County late Saturday with the result that four persons were fatally injured, seven were seriously hurt, and a half hundred others were wounded by the falling of a grand stand at Heggins, near here.
