Viotoria, B. C., Aug. 10.—The proposed pelagic sealing treaty will be negotiated between Great Britain and the United States in October, according to advices from Washington. Whether Canada will be a party is unknown. Preliminary arrangements were carried out some months ago. As the friends of Russia we watched with profound interest the creation of the Russian Parliament and its struggle for Russian Parliament and its struggle for existence. The triumph of liberty in Russia, which we hope is near, will permit the Russian and French people loyally to support the Franco-Russian alliance, upon the basis of common ideals and interests.

"The Russian Parliament is dead. Long live the Russian Parliament."


