NEW PARTY AT MOSCOW

Working For Peaceful Solution of Russian Problems.

Will Endeavor to Unite the Progressive Elements of Society Who Do Not Believe in Violent Revolution—Defeat of Candidates of Extremists of All Parties End in View—Leading Frenchmen Extol Parliament.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 11.—The healthiest symptoms of the situation are the efforts now being made at Moscow by the new party of pacific regeneration, ex-Octoberists, to secure the active co-operation of the moderate-minded Constitutional Democrats and unite the progressive elements of society, which do not believe in a violent revolution, and to defeat the candidates of the extremists of all parties at the coming elections.

Should the negotiations be successful, it is the intention to issue an appeal to the country, asking for a peaceful solution of the political, economic and ethical problems to sink individual differences, unite and compel the Government to realize the aspirations for a constitutional regime, and at the same time, the revolution, has been instructed to visit Victoria and report concerning sealing fleet and local sealing conditions.

Traced to Flying Fighters. The attempts on the lives of Vice-Admiral Douhaissoff, ex-Governor-General of Moscow, and of Gen. Nepluff, commander of the Sebastopol Fortresses, have been traced to the "flying fighting organization of the social revolutionists."

Douhaissoff's assailant, who was killed by the explosion of his own bomb, has now been positively identified. A girl student, Miss Mischchenko, who was involved in the conspiracy, and who is a daughter of Gen. Mischchenko, a member of the military council, while loading a bomb, had three of her fingers blown off, and was otherwise terribly mutilated.

About 400 of the Cronstadt mutineers will be tried by court-martial.

The central prison bureau has sent out a circular, warning to the wardens of penitentiaries to be on their guard against new revolutionary organization, formed to release political prisoners with the aid of sympathetic keepers and guards. Many jail deliveries are already attributed to the work of this organization.

Brigands on Bicycles. Moscow, Aug. 11.—A band of brigands on bicycles is systematically robbing village churches in this vicinity, avowedly with the intention to secure funds for the revolutionists.

On the Rampage. Yerkhovsky, Siberia, Aug. 11.—A roving band of Circassians rode into the railroad station here yesterday and robbed the cashier of \$47,500.

EXTOL OUTLAWED DOUMA. Leading French Statesmen Unite in Issuing Address.

Paris, Aug. 11.—The leading Senators, deputies, former Cabinet Ministers and members of the Institute of the academy have united in an address extolling the outlawed Russian Parliament as the bulwark on which Russia's hopes are dependent.

The address says: "History teaches us that a representative Government and individual liberty form the only certain means on which a nation can found progress and prosperity. As the friends of Russia we watched with profound interest the creation of the Russian Parliament and its struggle for existence. The triumph of liberty in Russia, which we hope is near, will permit the Russian and French peoples to support the Franco-Russian alliance, upon the basis of common ideals and interests."

"The Russian Parliament is dead. Long live the Russian Parliament."

Oil Companies Indicted. Jamestown, N. Y., Aug. 11.—The federal grand jury for the western district of New York yesterday reported twenty-two indictments against the Standard Oil Co. of New York, the Pennsylvania Railroad and the Vacuum Oil Co., which has refineries at Olean, N. Y., and Rochester, N. Y. Each of the 22 counts constitutes a separate offence.

It was fixed at \$20,000 for each of the defendants. If convictions on each count follow the penalties would amount to \$3,400,000.

Deckhands Get Increase. New York, Aug. 11.—A large percentage of the railroad tugboats affected by the strike Wednesday night of several hundred hands were running yesterday. The Erie granted the deckhands an increase of \$5 a month in pay. The first-class deckhands demands a \$10 advance. This concession was granted, pending the decision of an arbitration board, to be appointed jointly by the employees and the railroad.

Manslaughter Charged. Sherbrooke, Aug. 11.—Marcel Casteau and Gadois Casteau appeared before Judge Mulvena Thursday evening, each on a separate warrant issued by the coroner, charging them with manslaughter in connection with the death of Moise Casteau.

Four Years and the Lash. London, Aug. 11.—Arthur Lavigne, a young French-Canadian sectionman, was sentenced by Judge Edward Elliott yesterday morning to four years in the Kingston Penitentiary and twenty-five lashes for criminally assaulting two little girls.

Saskatchewan Masons. Regina, Sask., Aug. 11.—A grand lodge of Masons for Saskatchewan was instituted here yesterday. Twenty-five lodges were represented.

STENSLAND A PLUNGER.

Memorandum Shows One Win and Heavy Losses on Races.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—In addition to the discovery of a private ledger, kept by President Paul C. Stensland of the wrecked Milwaukee avenue State Bank, and in which was concealed a record of \$191,000 of savings bank deposits, another sensational book came to light.

This book showed that the missing president was a heavy plunger on the races. It contained memoranda of the campaigns on the turf.

One day Stensland and some companions bet \$75,000 to win \$60,000 on a certain horse. The animal won. There was lots of losses, however, shown by the book.

Bank Teller Shoots Himself. Frank Kowalski, paying teller of the failed Milwaukee avenue State Bank, of which Paul C. Stensland was president, shot and killed himself last evening at his home. No charges had been brought against him in connection with the failure of the bank.

At Fort William. Fort William, Aug. 11.—The steamer American, reported to have on board President Paul C. Stensland of the failed Milwaukee avenue State Bank of Chicago, arrived here Thursday and cleared four hours later for Royal Island. The Port Arthur police department declares that it has received instructions to arrest Stensland nor had it been informed that he was coming this way.

RICH WOMAN A VAGRANT. When Arrested She Had \$7,000 in Bills With Her.

Pittsburg, Aug. 11.—Isabella Jones was arrested in Allegheny yesterday morning on charges of vagrancy and disorderly conduct. In default of a fine she was committed to the county jail. While searching her at the jail one of the women attendants almost fainted when she discovered \$7,000 in bills.

The woman would give no information concerning herself or the money, and word was sent to the Allegheny police. It then developed that Jones was a fictitious name. The woman belongs to one of the wealthiest families in this city. An attorney was procured and the prisoner was released on bail. Her family will endeavor to have her placed in a sanatorium.

CONVICTS STEAL LOCOMOTIVE. Run Ten Miles From Camp Pursued by Guards.

Atlanta, Aug. 11.—Four long-term homicide convicts stole a locomotive at the Milltown lumber plant, pulled the throttle wide open and flew down the Milltown Railway at high speed.

As the locomotive flashed through the convict camp a volley was fired by the guards. Bullets struck the engine and tender, but the convicts were unhurt.

Guards on another locomotive were soon in pursuit, but the convicts had a long lead and were not overtaken. Ten miles from the camp they abandoned the locomotive, after crippling it, and took to the woods.

Bloodhounds have been put on their trail.

RATES TOO HIGH. Toronto Firm Succeeds in Complaint Against Railways.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The Railway Commission has ordered the C. P. R. and G. T. R. to reduce their tolls for east-bound traffic from Toronto to Montreal to those charged for similar westbound traffic between the same points, the tolls to Ottawa and intermediate points are not to exceed those to Montreal.

The reduction comes into force on Sept. 10. The complaint was made by Stoughton, Limited, wall-paper manufacturer, of Toronto.

The Railway Commission is issuing an order to allow the National Transcontinental to cross the line of the C. P. R. by means of a subway near St. Basile, in the County of Portneuf.

COUPLE RESIST LAW. Mr. and Mrs. Shackleton Fined For Obstructing Bailiff.

Bowmanville, Aug. 11.—In the Police Court here Thursday, Richard J. Mallory, bailiff, brought action against Richard Shackleton, farmer, of Lotus, Manvers Township, and his wife, for resisting and obstructing him in the execution of a distress warrant and seizure under an execution of the Division Court.

Police Magistrate Horsey fined Shackleton \$20 and \$10.20 costs or two months in jail. Mrs. Shackleton was allowed to go on suspended sentence by giving a bond of \$200 to obey the summons of the court when called upon.
