International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow.

The Captivity of Judah—II, Chron., 36, 11-21.

Golden Text—"Be sure your sin will find you out."

Zedekiah was the last King of Judah, Nebuchadnezzar King of Babylon, and Hophra of Egypt at this time. All prophecy has literal fulfillment; the cloud-burst of judgment must come to the nation.

The Ammonites, Moabites, Edomites and Philistines all assisted in the onslaught on Jerusalem and rejoiced in the destruction of their ancient enemy. God's feeling toward Judah all through the centuries of their apostasy was one of long-suffering love; but though God is long-suffering, judgment must come at last if men will not repent—II, Peter, 3, 9-10.

The day of the final destruction of this unholy city was the 10th day of the fifth month, 589 B. C., and the day is still observed by the Jews as a fast day, only second to the great Day of Atonement. On the same day of the same month the City of Jerusalem was again destroyed by Titus, A. D. 70.

How terribly often it is written of evil people, "He did that which was against the sight of the Lord his God." All lives are under the direct eye of God, therefore we are directly responsible to Him.

Before men we may be like an old-fashioned beehive, you can't see what goes on inside; but before God we are as glass houses; all within us is seen and known of Him. His all-seeing eye is an ever-present witness. Everything came to pass as God, through His servants and prophets predicted. Kings and princes and people became prisoners of war because they departed from God.

Every one of us have our choice between serving God with joyfulness and gladness of heart, or serving our enemies in wretchedness and ruin.

The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. Humbly and thankfully take the gift.
