One of our most successful fruit-growers informed us this week that the present indications are that our apple crop this year will be a good one and the fruit of a most superior quality.

Rev. O. B. Pitblado, in an eloquent sermon preached lately in Winnipeg, said: "Our birthright is one of world-wide sympathies. Britain is world-wide omnipresent. She controls the steamships and very largely the highways of transportation of the world, keeps the gateways of all the great channels of commerce."

The appointment of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, as Secretary of State for the Colonies, is taken as an indication of the growing importance of the colonies in the eyes of the Home Government.

Dairying in Nova Scotia.

As an index of the development of dairy farming in Nova Scotia, the attendance at and interest in the annual meeting of our Farmers' and Dairymen's Association have most clearly shown that year by year our farmers are becoming more and more convinced that dairying is one of the most profitable branches of farming in which they can engage.

While we as an association take considerable credit for this advancement along dairy lines it is but just to say that the increased interest shown by our farmers in this direction is in the main due to the enthusiastic efforts of our Dairy Commissioner, Prof. Jas. W. Robertson, who has been ably assisted by Mr. J. S. Hopkins, manager of the Nappan dairy station, and by Col. W. M. Blair, superintendent of the Maritime Experimental Farm. Of Col. Blair it may be truly said that there is probably no other man in Nova Scotia who has labored so incessantly for the uplifting of the farming population, having, as he has, devoted almost his whole lifetime to the advancement of agriculture in our province.

But we believe that dairying with us is yet in its infancy and that the next few years will witness a much larger extension and growth than has already taken place. In many sections of our county more particularly in the districts containing dyked marshes, the selling of hay has largely obtained, and the farmers have been forced to face a serious deterioration of the fertility of their farms, and a corresponding shrinkage in their incomes consequent upon this unscientific method of conducting their business.

By growing these finished goods our incomes will be augmented and at the same time our farms, instead of falling off in fertility, will steadily increase in productivity. With every promise so far of an abundant yield of grass this present season, the outlook for the farmer who depends upon the selling of hay for his income, is, to say the least, not very encouraging. It behooves us then to change our base of operations and endeavor to provide these articles which the market demands. We want to count on hay, supplemented with other foods easily grown on the farm, into pork. It is true that just at present the market for butter and cheese is somewhat depressed but we believe that this depression is only temporary, and a review of the prices obtained for farm crops for the past few years will show that the products of the dairy cow have felt the effects of the hard times the least of all.

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The End at Last.

The Buchanan tragedy is at last over. After unparalleled delay, extending over a period of years, the majesty of the law has been vindicated and R. W. Buchanan has paid the penalty of his crime.

Dr Buchanan's last night, (Sunday) was a restless one. He seemed to be on the point of nervous collapse. After his wife left he retired to his couch where he pitched and tossed in nervous wakefulness until 2 a. m., when he fell into a restless sleep.

At three o'clock his sleep became somewhat sounder and continued broken until six o'clock when he awoke and prepared for the day. He inquired anxiously for any hopeful news, but there was none to give him.

At 9 o'clock on Monday morning the warden entered, accompanied by a minister, who was to administer to Buchanan's spiritual wants. Up to this time, Buchanan had steadily refused to see a clergyman.

Mrs Buchanan had journeyed during the night to Ellerslie, the country residence of Governor Morton, and made one more attempt to save her husband. Her trip was fruitless, for before ten o'clock a telegram from her was received saying the governor had absolutely refused to interfere.

At 11 o'clock the fatal procession to the death chamber began. All the witnesses for the state were present. Dr Buchanan, wonderfully calm, was strapped to the electric chair. At 11.20 the current was turned on and the story of a wrecked life closed.

Mrs Buchanan notified Warden Sage after the execution that she intended to claim her husband's body and give it burial. The warden started a subscription on her behalf and nearly all the officers of the prison and the witnesses of the execution contributed.

Mrs Buchanan left for New York at 2.25 p. m. She was much calmer, and expressed thanks for the kindness of the warden's family.
