

DEATHS NOT MANY FROM BAD

LIQUOR WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The death rate from poisoned bootleg liquor has been greatly over-advertised. Wital statistics are now available which show that the toll from illicit liquor from wood alcohol poisoning has not increas-ed to any alarming extent over the pre-prohibition days. In New York City in 1910 there were six deaths traced to wood alcohol. In 1%22, the latest figures available, the deaths from this cause reached a total of 14. At the same time the deaths from alcoholism dropped from 621 to 226. Even the dry advocates are surprised by the figures. They account for them by asying that fewer people are drinking liquor than formerly and frankly admit the death rate from poisoned liquor has been below what was expected.


