NATURAL GAS. Thorold Wants Its Importation to the States Stopped.

(Special Despatch to The Times.) St. Catharines, April 8.—The natural gas question is becoming a serious one in this city and in the neighboring town of Thorold.

The notification served on their customers by the United Gas Company, that on April 20th they will increase the price from 30 cents to 55 cents—thousand cubic feet.

MARKETS and FINANCE

TORONTO MARKETS. Live Stock. Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, were 94 car loads, composed of 1,625 cattle, 932 hogs, 181 sheep and 395 calves.

Exporters—There were several lots of cattle of the export class that were a credit to the farmer who fed them, that were brought to be slaughtered here for the Easter trade.

Export steers are worth from \$5 to \$5.75; export bulls, \$4.25 to \$4.50 for the bulk of sales.

Milkers and Springers—Milkers and springers sold at \$30 to \$37 each.

Butchers—Easter cattle of choice quality sold from \$5.60 to \$6, and one or two extra choice at more money; good loads, \$5.20 to \$5.50; fair to good, \$4.90 to \$5; good to choice cows, \$4.25 to \$4.60; medium cows, \$3.50 to \$4; common cattle and camels, \$2 to \$3.

Veal Calves—Deliveries were large, prices steady at \$3.50 to \$7; the bulk of the good sold at \$5.50 to \$6.50.

Sheep and Lambs—Export ewes, \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt.; rams at \$4 to \$4.75; lambs of choice quality, \$7.75 to \$8.25, with some extra Easter lambs at \$8.25 to \$9 per cwt.; common inferior yearlings, \$3 to \$6; spring lambs at \$4 to \$9 each.

The bulk of the spring lambs sold around \$6 to \$7 each.

Hogs—Hogs 10c per cwt. higher. Mr. Harris quotes selects at \$6.40 and lights, of which there are too many coming on the market, at \$6.15 per cwt.

Farmers' Market. The offerings of grain to-day were small, being only two loads of barley, which sold at 38c per bushel.

Hay in liberal supply, with prices easier; 40 loads sold at \$17 to \$19 a ton. Straw sold at \$16 a ton for one load.

Dressed hogs are in limited supply, with prices firmer. Light sold at \$8.25 to \$8.50, and heavy at \$8.

CORD WOOD CASE. Chatham, April 8.—At the Spring Assizes Justice Riddell dismissed a suit by Joseph Sherrah, of Chatham, against Frank Grant, of Raleigh, to recover \$10,000 for alleged malicious prosecution.

Sherrah instituted proceedings after being acquitted on the charge of stealing ten coils of wood brought against him by Grant.

LABOR LAW CASE. New York, April 8.—The first judgment under the Labor law passed by the Legislature in May, 1906, making railway companies responsible for injuries received by an employee through the negligence of another employee, has been awarded in the Supreme Court.
