DENMARK.

Prince Christian of Denmark, the adopted heir apparent of the King, is on the point of going to Berlin or a mission of the greatest delicacy to the King of Prussia. It is understood that in the same way as the Emperor Ferdinand not only abdicated the throne of Austria, but induced his next brother to do so in order to make room for the present Emperor Francis Joseph, so the King of Denmark, disgusted as he is with public affairs, and the incessant cabals and counter-intrigues of the court and his cabinet, and himself lacking the talent and capacity for making himself master of the situation, has not only resolved to become one of the "monarchs retired from business," but has persuaded his uncle and next heir, the Prince Ferdinand, to relinquish his claim to the succession, so that Prince Christian may be able to mount the Danish throne at once.
