"In his description of the final acts and sentence which immediately pre ceded, accompanied and followed Cardina Newman's reception into the Catholi Church, the lecturer was at his very best says our contemporary. "Into this threw his whole soul, the eloquence being really dromatic in its effect." "Then fol lowed several luminous reference to master-piece among Newman's gres works the "Apololgia pro Vita Sua, This was described by the lecturer that is powerful and striking."
